# **Chapter 1 Getting Started**

## Introduction

This chapter provides an overview of RFID technology and components, and explains how to set up the mobile device for the first time

## **RFID Technology Overview**

RFID (Radio Frequency Identification) is an advanced automatic identification (Auto ID) technology that uses radio frequency signals to identify *tagged* items. An RFID tag contains a circuit that can store data. This data may be pre-encoded or can be encoded in the field. The tags come in a variety of shapes and sizes.

To read a tag the mobile computer sends out radio frequency waves using its integrated antenna. This RF field powers and charges the tags, which are tuned to receive radio waves. The tags use this power to modulate the carrier signal. The reader interprets the modulated signal and converts the data to a format for computer storage. The computer application translates the data into an understandable format.




Figure 1-1 RFID System Elements

## **RFID Components**

Motorola RFID solutions offer low cost, long read range, and a high read rate. These features provide real time end-to-end visibility of products and assets in the factory, distribution center, retail outlet, or other facility. The RFID system consists of the following components:

- Silicon-based RFID tags that attach to retail products, vehicles, trailers, containers, pallets, boxes, etc.
- An integrated antenna that supports applications such as item level tracking and asset tracking.
- An embedded radio module that powers and communicates with tags for data capture and provides host connectivity for data migration.

#### **Tags**

Tags contain embedded chips that store unique information. Available in various shapes and sizes, tags, often called *transponders*, receive and respond to data requests. Tags require power to send data.

There are several categories of tags based on the protocol they support, read/write memory, and power options:

- Active RFID tags are powered by internal light-weight batteries, and also use these batteries to broadcast radio waves to the reader.
- Semi-passive RFID tags are also powered by internal light-weight batteries, but draw broadcasting power from the reader.
- Passive RFID tags are powered by a reader-generated RF field. These tags are much lighter and less expensive than active tags, and are typically applied to less expensive goods.

#### **Antenna**

Antennas transmit and receive radio frequency signals.

#### **Radio Module**

The radio module communicates with the tags and transfers the data to a host computer. It also provides features such as filtering, CRC check, and tag writing. The RFID mobile computers supports standard RFID tags as described by EPCGlobal<sup>TM</sup> Class 1 Gen2 protocol.

## **RFID Sled Features**

The RFD5500 RFID Sled adds a RFID gun-style handle with a scanning trigger to the MCXX. Used for all RFID operations, the RFD5500 increases comfort when using the terminal in scan-intensive applications for extended periods of time.




Figure 1-2 RFD5500 RFID Sled Features

## **LED Definitions**

The RFD5500 uses a two-color LED to indicate status.

# **RFID Sled Battery Installation**

To install the battery:

- Insert the battery, connector end first, into the battery compartment.
- Press down on the battery until the battery latch snaps into place.




Figure 1-3 RFID Sled Battery Insertion

To remove the battery:

- 1. Open battery latch on bottom of RFID Sled handle.
- 2. Remove battery.




Figure 1-4 RFID Sled Battery Removal

# **Attach Mobile Computer to RFID Sled**

To insert the Mobile Computer into the RFID Sled, slide the MCXX into the RFID Sled until it locks in place. The latches secure the MCXX to the RFID Sled.




Figure 1-5 Insert Mobile Computer into RFID Sled

To remove the MCXX, press the release buttons and pull the MCXX forward and up.




Figure 1-6 Remove Mobile Computer from RFID Sled

# **RFID Sled Charging and Communication**

## **Charging and Communication**

The RFID Sled can be used to charge the MCXX and communicate with a host computer using either the USB charging cable or a cradle, or connect to a peripheral.

### **Using the USB Charge and Communication Cable**

To charge the MCXX battery or communicate with a host computer while the MCXX is in the RFID Sled, use the USB Charging Cable setup below:




Figure 1-8 Sample of MCxx Front View




Figure 1-9 Sample of MCxx Rear View

# **Chapter 2 MobileRFID Functionality**

## Introduction

MobileRFID is an RFID server application that runs in the background of the Mobile Computer. The MobileRFID icon appears on the screen. This chapter includes information on using and configuring MobileRFID.

## **Installing a microSD Card**

The microSD card slot provides secondary non-volatile storage. The slot is located under the battery pack. Refer to the documentation provided with the card for more information and follow the manufacturer's recommendations for use.



**CAUTION** Follow proper ESD precautions to avoid damaging the SD card. Proper ESD precautions include, but are not limited to, working on an ESD mat and ensuring that the operator is properly grounded.



**NOTE** For SIM Card installation, refer to the Mobile Computer user guide for instruction.

To install the microSD card:

- 1. Lift rubber access door.
- 2. Slide the SIM card holder door up to unlock.
- 3. Lift SIM card holder door.




Figure 2-2 Lift SIM Slot Holder Door

- 4. Lift microSD card holder door.
- Insert the microSD card into card holder door ensuring that the card slides into the holding tabs on each side of the door.




Figure 2-3 Insert microSD Card in Holder

- 6. Close the card holder door and push down until it is securely into place.
- 7. Close SIM card holder door and slide down until it locks into place.
- 8. Close rubber access door.

## **Enabling RFID on the Mobile Computer**

To enable RFID on the MCxx device:

- 1. Download the MCRFIDInstall cab file from the support central website at: http://www.motorolasolutions.com/support.
- 2. Copy the file into one of the following folders:
  - \Temp folder of the target Mobile Computer
  - \SD card of the target Mobile Computer.
- 3. On the display of the Mobile Computer, navigate to the folder previously selected and launch the cab file.
- 4. Upon completion of install, the Mobile Computer reboots.
- 5. When the device comes back online:
  - If the RFID icon on the home screen is *Green*, the Mobile Computer is connected to the radio module of the sled.
  - If the RFID icon on the home screen is Blinking, the Mobile Computer is trying to connect to radio module of the sled.
  - If the RFID icon on the home screen has a *Red X*, this implies the Mobile Computer is unable to connect to the radio module. Connect the sled and restart the RFID connection process as shown in *Figure 2-27 on page 2-20*.

## **MobileRFID Icons**

The MobileRFID icon indicates RFID radio status as follows:

If using RFID as the Windows default home screen, tap the *RFID* icon, then tap the **Settings** button.

## **Combined Firmware Loader**

The RFD5500 unit has two separate processors. A processor for control and a processor for the radio. Both processors support field upgradable firmware. This application is provided to allow either or both firmware to be updated in the field. The application loads a Combined Firmware File ([example].CFF) which determines and performs the necessary steps to load the contents of the file to the unit.

The application will perform a sequence of steps to update a unit depending on the contents of the Combined Firmware File which may include:

- Loading a new control firmware
- · Updating the radio configuration
- Loading a new radio firmware.

Each stage is indicated on the user interface and the progress for that stage displays.

#### **Combined Firmware Installation**

The application is provided as a cab file. To install the firmware:

- 1. Copy the cab file to the Mobile Computer that will be used to perform the firmware update.
- 2. Browse to the cab file using file explorer on the Mobile Computer and tap the cab file to install the application.
- 3. Accept the *default* location and tap **Install** to complete the installation.
- 4. The Combined Firmware Loader application appears as an application on the Start Menu.

#### **Combined Firmware Application**

Along with the cab file for the application, a *Combined Firmware File* (.CFF) is provided which contains the update for RFD5500 unit. Copy the file to a folder (your *My Documents* folder is suggested for easy access). Select the *default* location to install. Once installation is complete, a confirmation message displays to let you know that the Combined Firmware Loader successfully installed.

### **Combined Firmware Preparation**

To ensure a successful update, the RFD5500 and associated mobile device should be on charge for the duration of the update. The application tests to see if the Mobile Computer is charging when an update is started. If the Mobile Computer is not on charge, the application will check the battery level of the Mobile Computer and the RFD5500 unit. If either battery is below half charge, the application will display an appropriate error and will not commence the update. A USB ActiveSync connection should be disconnected if present.

Before the application performs an update to the RFD5500, it checks that the file provided is compatible with the current hardware and not commence the update if the RFD5500 is not compatible.

If an update does not succeed, it should be sufficient to perform any corrective action required and restart the update. Refer to the *Combined Firmware Troubleshooting on page 2-9* section for more information.

#### **Launch Combined Firmware Application**

To start the application, tap the **Combined Firmware Loader** icon on the Start Menu.






Figure 2-6 Combined Firmware Launch Screen

The accessory Com port is detected automatically and displays at the top of the screen.

Tap the (...) button (shown next to the second field in the first screen above) to select a Combined Firmware File ("\*.CFF") to update the accessory. Once a file is selected the file name is displayed.

## **Performing an Update**

Tap the **Update** button to begin an update. The application loads the selected file, determines the steps required to perform the update and displays the steps as they are performed. Depending on the file selected, a different number of tasks will be displayed.

#### **Update Control Firmware Only**




Figure 2-7 Update Control Firmware Only

#### **Update OEM Registers**




Figure 2-8 Update OEM Register Only

#### **Update Radio and Control Firmware**




Figure 2-9 Update Radio and Control Firmware

### **Combined Firmware Troubleshooting**

If an update fails, it is likely to be an easily corrected error by selecting **Update** to restart the application. The application detects the current state of the accessory and performs the required steps to complete the update.




Figure 2-10 Update Failed Message

- Invalid firmware file/Hardware Not Compatible If the application reports that the Combined Firmware File is invalid or not compatible with the accessory, contact the supplier of the file to obtain the correct file for the hardware.
- Low Battery -The application requires the Mobile Computer and accessory to be on charge to perform the update. If not on charge, the battery of both the accessory and the mobile device must have sufficient charge to complete the update. Either put the Mobile Computer and accessory on charge and update while charging or charge both units before attempting to update again.
- Communication Error If the update fails while updating the radio firmware, the accessory may lock in the radio bootloader. If this occurs, the accessory should be detached from the Mobile Computer and the accessory battery removed. After five seconds, replace the battery and the accessory attached to the Mobile Computer and restart the update.

## **ETSI Channel Selector**

The ETSI Channel Selector allows a user to enable or disable the channels in use on a RFD5500 when configured for the ETSI regulatory region.

The application is provided as a cab file. Copy the cab file to the Mobile Computer that will be used with the RFD5500. Browse to the cab file using file explorer on the Mobile Computer and tap on the cab file to install the application. Accept the *default* location and tap **Install** to complete the installation. The application *ETSI Channel Select* will then appear as an application on the Start Menu.

## **ETSI Channel Selector Application**

Tap the Channel Selector icon located on the Start Menu screen.

To start the application, tap the *ETSI Channel Select* icon on the main screen from the Start Menu. Select the check box(s) to enable required channels.






Figure 2-13 ETSI Channel Selector Main Screen

Channel selection options are as follows:


- Read Reads the current selection from the UHF Reader and updates the screen
- Write Writes the current selection to the UHF Reader
- OK Exits the application.

#### **Read Channel Selection**

To read the current selection, tap the **Read** button. The application will connect to the Reader, read the configuration and disconnect.







#### Write Channel Selection

Select required channels and tap the **Write** button to write the current selection. The application will connect to the Reader, write the configuration and disconnect.





Figure 2-15 Writing Channel Selection Screens

- If a read or write does not succeed an error message will be displayed.
- The application will only work with the 1138-01 ETSI units.
- When writing, at least one channel must be enabled.
- If you have trouble connecting to the UHF Reader:
  - Check connection
  - · Confirm that the battery is installed
  - · Check that the battery is charged.

## **RFID Region Configuration**

### **Region Configuration Operation**

Tap on the RFID Region Configuration icon on the Start Menu.

The configuration application loads and a regulatory screen appears. Tap **OK** to accept the warning and continue. **Cancel** will exit the application.






Figure 2-18 RFID Region Configuration Start Screen

Use the dropdown list to select the serial port (COM), virtual or real, that the Reader connects to. Tap on the **Connect** button.

After a short delay, the configuration application connects to the Reader. The **Connect** button appears grey and the list of available regulatory regions for the RFID Reader is displayed in the dropdown list.

### **Configuring Region by Country**

Before writing a new region, make sure that the Reader and Mobile Computer batteries are fully charged. Select the country that is required (the region which applies is shown in brackets).

The list is filtered to only show the countries and regions that are compatible with the Reader that is currently connected. The contents of the list may therefore vary from those shown above.

Tap on the required region and then tap the **Write** button to start the process of configuring the Reader to the new region. The message *Updating Region* displays.

When the update is complete, a confirmation message appears stating the region programmed. Tap the **OK** button to exit the application.

The current country selection and regulatory region for a Reader can be viewed by tapping the **Read** button. When the read is complete, a message appears with the region that the Reader is set to and the date it was selected.

To Verify the programmed Reader region against the region file, select the required region from the dropdown list and tap **Verify**. When the verify is complete, a message appears stating *Region is programmed correctly* or *Programmed region does not match values from file*.

### **MobileRFID Client Mode**

RFID is in Server Mode by default. To configure RFID to operate in Client Mode:

1. Invoke the MobileRFID menu and then tap Configure RFID.




Figure 2-25 MobileRFID Configuration Screen

- 2. Select the Client Mode check box.
- 3. In the *LLRP Port* field, enter the port number on which the server waits for the RFID client to communicate. The default is 5084.
- 4. In the Server IP field, enter the server IP for the remote host to which RFID communicates as a client.
- 5. Tap Apply.
- 6. Tap **OK** to close the window.

### **MobileRFID Version Information**

To view software version information for the RFID application, invoke the MobileRFID menu and tap About.






Figure 2-26 About MobileRFID Screen

## **MobileRFID Run/Stop RFID**

To stop RFID service, tap **Stop** in MobileRFID menu. To restart RFID, tap **Run** in MobileRFID menu.




Figure 2-27 RFID Run/Stop Screen

# **Chapter 3 RFID Sample Application**

### Introduction

The RFID Application CS\_RFID3Sample6.exe provides an overview of how the application works and assists application developers in developing custom applications.

The Mobile Computer can read, write, lock, kill, and program Gen2 tags. Each tag contains the EPC number (64 or 96 bits), CRC, and kill code. The Mobile Computer can also collect data by decoding in-range EPC Gen2 RFID tags.

Initiating the read command within the sample application causes the Mobile Computer to interrogate all RFID tags within the radio frequency (RF) field of view. The reader captures data from each new tag and adds it to the list box in the **EPC ID** window. Select **Stop Read** to stop interrogating tags.

## **Launching the RFID Sample Application**

Tap the RFID Demo icon on the Start Menu to start the RFID sample application.

In the sample application window, tap the **Start Reading** button to initiate the tag read. Tap **Stop Reading** to terminate tag reading.



**NOTE** The RFD5500 does not support the *Mem Bank* drop-down used to select a tag memory bank to read.




Figure 3-2 RFID Sample Application Screen

Tap Connection to display the Reader IP and port number. Select Disconnect to disconnect the Reader.






Figure 3-3 Connection Screen

## **Capabilities**

Select Menu > Capabilities to view the capabilities of the connected Reader.




Figure 3-4 Capabilities Screen

## **Configuration Menu Options**

The Configuration menu includes the following options:

- Tag Storage Settings
- Antenna
- RF Mode
- Singulation
- Power On/Off Radio
- Reset to Factory Defaults.

### **Tag Storage Settings**

Select Menu > Config > Tag Storage Settings to view/configure tag storage settings.






Figure 3-5 Tag Storage Settings Screen

- Maximum Tag Count The maximum number of tags to store in the DLL.
- Max Tag ID Length The maximum tag length.
- Max Size of Memory Bank Storage to allocate for the memory bank data.
- Apply Select to apply the configuration changes.

#### **Antenna**

Select Menu > Config > Antenna to view/configure the antenna.




Figure 3-6 Antenna Configuration Screen

- Antenna ID Selecting an antenna ID updates the configuration values in the other fields.
- Receive Sensitivity (dB) Lists the Reader-supported values for the selected antenna.
- Transmit Power (dBm) Lists the Reader-supported values for the selected antenna.
- Hop Table Index Updates the Hop Frequency list with its corresponding frequencies.
- Apply Select to apply the configuration changes.

#### **RF Mode**

Select Menu > Config > RF Mode to view/configure the RF mode for each antenna.

- Antenna ID Selecting an antenna ID updates the configuration values in the other fields.
- Tari Value TARI specified in nsec.
- RF Mode Table RF mode table configured for the current antenna.
- Apply Select to apply the configuration changes.

# Singulation

Select Menu > Config > Singulation to view/configure the singulation control settings for each antenna.

- Antenna ID Selecting an antenna ID updates the configuration values in the other fields.
- Session The session number for the inventory operation.
- Tag Population The approximate tag population in the RF field of the antenna.
- Tag Transit Time The time in milliseconds that the tag typically remains in the RF field of the antenna.
- State Aware Indicates if the antenna performs state aware or state unaware singulation.
- Inventory State Select a tag of state A or B. Valid only for State Aware singulation.
- SL Flag Valid only for State Aware singulation.
- Apply Select to apply the configuration changes.

### Power On/Off Radio

Select Menu > Config > Power On/Off Radio to change the power settings of the RFID radio.




Figure 3-9 Radio Power Settings Menu

### **Reset to Factory Default**

Select Menu > Config > Reset to Factory Default to restore the default Reader configuration.

## **Operations Menu Options**

The **Operations** menu includes the following options:

- Antenna Info
- Filter
- Access
- Triggers.

### **Antenna Info**

Select **Menu > Operations > Antenna Info** to view/configure the list of antennas that can be used for inventory/access operations.




Figure 3-10 Antenna Info Screen

#### **Filter**

Select **Menu > Operations > Filter** to view/configure the following filters:

- Pre-Filter
- Post-Filter
- Access-Filter

#### **Pre-Filter**

Select Menu > Operations > Filter > Pre-Filter to view/configure pre-filters.






Figure 3-11 PreFilter Screen

- Antenna ID Selecting an antenna ID updates the configuration values in the other fields.
- Memory Bank Memory bank on which the filter is applied.
- Offset The first (msb) bit location of the specified memory bank against which to compare the tag mask.
- Tag Pattern The pattern against which to compare the specified memory bank.
- Filter Action Select the required filter action. For more information, refer to the Gen2 specification available at http://www.epcglobalinc.org/standards/.

#### **Post-Filter**

Select Menu > Operations > Filter > Post-Filter to view/configure post-filters.






Figure 3-12 PostFilter Screen

- Memory Bank Memory bank on which the filter is applied.
- Offset The first (msb) bit location of the specified memory bank against which to compare the tag mask.
- Tag Pattern The pattern against which to compare the specified memory bank.
- Tag Mask The bit mask to facilitate bit wise filtering.
- Match Pattern Select the tag pattern to match (A, B, both, or neither).

#### **Access-Filter**

Select Menu > Operations > Filter > Access-Filter to view/configure the access-filters.






Figure 3-13 AccessFilter Screen

#### **Access**

Select Menu > Operations > Access to perform the following access operations.




Figure 3-14 Access Menu

The Access menu includes the following options:

- Read
- Write
- Lock
- Kill
- Block Write
- Block Erase.

To perform an access option on a single tag, right-click the tag in the list of read tags on the main screen to invoke the tag's context menu.

#### **Access Operation Windows**

The access operation windows include the following fields. Set options as required in the various parameter windows. Not all windows include all options.

- Tag ID The name of the selected tag.
- Password Set a password before performing any access operation (except Kill).






Figure 3-18 Lock Access Operation Screen






Figure 3-20 Block Erase Access Operation Screen






Figure 3-21 Start Trigger - Periodic Screen






Figure 3-23 Start Trigger - Handheld Trigger Screen






Figure 3-24 Stop Trigger - Periodic Screen






Figure 3-25 Stop Trigger - GPI with Timeout Screen






Figure 3-29 Report Trigger Screen

# **Chapter 4 RapidRead Sample Application**

## **RapidRead Introduction**

RapidRead is a RFID handheld reader application used to demonstrate inventory and asset counting, tag writing and item locating.

## **RapidRead Options**

To access RapidRead, double tap the **RapidRead** icon on the home screen of the handheld reader or select **File Explorer** > **Program Files** > **RapidRead**.

To select specific options, select **Menu > Options**.




Figure 4-2 RapidRead Menu

The following selections are available on the **Options** screen:

- Scan Sounds (applicable for Lite and Full) check to produce a sound for unique tag reads only, rather than
  on each tag read.
- Tag (applicable for Lite only) check to display tag reads in SGTIN-96 format.
- Barcode check to display number of unique bar codes read rather than the total number of bar codes read.
- Unknown Tags (applicable for Full only) check to show tags which are not in the database but have been read.

## RapidRead Tag File

RapidRead has the ability to read and compare against an onboard tag database (tags.csv) displaying matching results, missing and unknown items that have been read during a session.

To implement after installation is complete:

- 1. Locate the tags.csv file in the RapidRead application folder (under Program files) on the handheld reader.
- 2. While connected to the PC through ActiveSyc or Windows Mobile Device Center, copy the **tags.csv** file from the handheld reader to desktop.



**NOTE** The **tags.csv** file is a database of tagged inventory and is comma delimited without header information.

- 3. Using a simple text based application such as, Microsoft® Notepad, modify the file to match your specific tag EPC numbers and enter **Item Descriptions**. Separate the EPC number and item description with a comma per line for each 'valid' tag.
- 4. When complete, save the **tags.csv** file to your PC and copy the file back to the handheld reader, replacing the original file.



**NOTE** The tag file must be renamed **tags** as it is the only database name that the handheld reader recognizes.




Figure 4-4 Sample List of Tags






Figure 4-5 RapidRead Main Screen

The four modes of operation are as follows:

- Lite read all tags in read range via RFID.
- Full read all tags in read range via RFID; compare against database (tags.csv).
- Scan bar code scanning (functions on both RFID enabled handheld as well as non-RFID handheld).
- Write function to encode RFID tags by key entry, bar code scanning, or STGIN-96.

## **RapidRead Lite**

RapidRead Lite offers the following features:

- Ability to scan all standard EPC class1 GEN2 tags within read range and display tag reads.
- Display EPC number read.
- Display number of times a particular tag has been read.
- Display unique tag count.




Figure 4-7 RapidRead Lite Detail Screen

- Validate read against the tag database (tags.csv) in the RapidRead application folder.
- Display associated asset configurable description.
- Display number of times a particular tag has been read.
- Display total read and unique tag read counts.
- Visual and audible feedback to assist in locating a particular tag (Geiger counter).

#### **Summary Screen**

The Summary screen displays the number of unique tags read.

#### **Detail Screen**

The color coded indicators (located next to the titles) are defined as follows:

- Green read is a match to an asset that has been defined in the tags.csv file.
- Yellow expected tag but has not been read.
- Red read does not have a match in the tags.csv file and is classified as unknown.

Select the **Detail tab** to display a list of individual reads. To clear the list, tap the **Clear Data** button.




Figure 4-9 RapidRead Full Detail Screen

#### **Gieger Counter**

The Gieger counter is a tag locator application that assists with locating missing items (applicable to RapidRead Full only). To use the Gieger counter feature:

1. Select the **Detail** tab.




Figure 4-11 Gieger Counter Read Rate

2. Tap one of the missing items. The Geiger Counter screen opens as displayed in Figure 4-11.

3. Pull the handheld trigger and begin to slowly move the reader around. As the reader approaches the item, beeping frequency increases and the visual bar on the screen will become larger.




Figure 4-13 RapidRead Scan Detail Screen

- 1. Enter 24 digits representing the RFID tag ID.
- 2. Check Auto-increment to increment the entered number by one digit for the next tag encode.
- 3. Tap the **Write Tag** button to write the information to the tag. Once encoded, a successful encode message will be displayed on screen.

#### **Bar Code Tab**

To write to a tag via bar code scan:

#### STGIN-96 Tab

## **Chapter 5 Tag Locator**

#### Introduction

Use Tag Locater to detect the location of a tag. By providing the TagID of an item, this application can find the relative position of the tag with respect to the mobile computer. Move the mobile computer back and forth to obtain the location of the tag as indicated by the beep frequency and a vertical progress bar showing the relative position of the tag.

The Tag Locater application requires the following components/DLLs on the device:

- RFIDAPI32.dll (Version 5.1.15 or higher)
- Symbol.RFID3.Device.dll (Assembly version 1.1.0.1, File version 1.1.0.7 or higher)
- Symbol.Audio.dll
- Symbol.dll
- Symbol.Notification.dll
- Symbol.StandardForms.dll.

## **Using Tag Locator**

To use the Tag Locator application:

1. Tap Tag Locator icon on the mobile computer to open the Tag Locater application.




Figure 5-3 Opening a .csv File




Figure 5-4 Tag List

- 4. Select the **Start Locating** button or press and hold the trigger. Move the mobile computer in all directions to get the relative position of the tag, indicated by a beep, the vertical progress bar, or both.




Figure 5-5 Tag Search

Use the Options menu to turn the beeper on and off and to display data in ASCII or hexadecimal format.




Figure 5-6 Options Menu

## **Chapter 6 Programming for RFD5500**

### **Programming**

The primary programming interface for the Motorola RFD5500 UHF sled reader is via the RFID3 API.

Applications for interacting with the RFD5500 sled reside on the mobile computer (MC device). Applications are developed using the RFID3 API set and use any standard assemblies included in the EMDK (as applicable). The supported programming languages are C (using Motorola EMDK for C) and .Net (using Motorola EMDK for .Net).

The recommended reference guide for the RFID3 API set is included as a part of the Motorola EMDK installer. It is available on the Motorola Support site at <a href="http://www.motorolasolutions.com/support">http://www.motorolasolutions.com/support</a>. The *Programmers Guide* included in the Help section contains an introduction on how to perform various functions using the RFID3 API set.

## **Chapter 7 Maintenance and Troubleshooting**

#### Introduction

This chapter includes instructions on cleaning and maintenance, and provides troubleshooting solutions for potential problems.

#### **Cleaning**

**CAUTION** Always wear eye protection.

Read warning label on compressed air and alcohol product before using.

If you have to use any other solution for medical reasons please contact Motorola for more information.

WARNING! Avoid exposing this product to contact with hot oil or other flammable liquids. If such exposure occurs, unplug the device and clean the product immediately in accordance with these guidelines.

#### **Approved Cleanser Active Ingredients**

100% of the active ingredients in any cleaner must consist of one or some combination of the following: isopropyl alcohol, bleach/sodium hypochlorite, hydrogen peroxide or mild dish soap.

#### **Harmful Ingredients**

The following chemicals are known to damage the plastics on the RFD5500 and Mobile Computers and should not come in contact with the device: ammonia solutions, compounds of amines or ammonia; acetone; ketones; ethers; aromatic and chlorinated hydrocarbons; acqueous or alcoholic alkaline solutions; ethanolamine; toluene; trichloroethylene; benzene; carbolic acid and TB-lysoform.

#### **Cleaning Instructions**

Do not apply liquid directly to the RFD5500 and Mobile Computers. Dampen a soft cloth or use pre-moistened wipes. Do not wrap the device in the cloth or wipe, but gently wipe the unit. Be careful not to let liquid pool around the display window or other places. Allow the unit to air dry before use.

#### **Special Cleaning Notes**

Many vinyl gloves contain phthalate additives, which are often not recommended for medical use and are known to be harmful to the housing of the RFD5500 and Mobile Computers. The RFD5500 should not be handled while wearing vinyl gloves containing phthalates, or before hands are washed to remove contaminant residue after gloves are removed. If products containing any of the harmful ingredients listed above are used prior to handling the RFD5500, such as hand sanitizer that contain ethanolamine, hands must be completely dry before handling the RFD5500 to prevent damage to the plastics.

#### **Materials Required**

- Alcohol wipes
- Lens tissue
- Cotton tipped applicators
- Isopropyl alcohol
- Can of compressed air with a tube.

#### **Cleaning Cradle Connectors**

To clean the connectors on a cradle:

- 1. Remove the DC power cable from the cradle.
- Dip the cotton portion of the cotton tipped applicator in isopropyl alcohol.
- Rub the cotton portion of the cotton tipped applicator along the pins of the connector. Slowly move the applicator back-and-forth from one side of the connector to the other. Do not let any cotton residue on the connector.
- 4. All sides of the connector should also be rubbed with the cotton tipped applicator.
- 5. Spray compressed air in the connector area by pointing the tube/nozzle about ½ inch away from the surface. CAUTION: do not point nozzle at yourself and others, ensure the nozzle or tube is pointed away from your face.
- 6. Ensure that there is no lint left by the cotton tipped applicator, remove lint if found.
- 7. If grease and other dirt can be found on other areas of the cradle, use lint free cloth and alcohol to remove.
- **8.** Allow at least 10 to 30 minutes (depending on ambient temperature and humidity) for the alcohol to air dry before applying power to cradle.
  - If the temperature is low and humidity is high, longer drying time is required. Warm temperature and dry humidity requires less drying time.

#### **Cleaning Frequency**

The cleaning frequency is up to the customer's discretion due to the varied environments in which the mobile devices are used. They may be cleaned as frequently as required. However when used in dirty environments it may be advisable to periodically clean the scanner exit window to ensure optimum scanning performance.

#### **Maintenance**

For trouble-free service, observe the tips that follow when using the device.

#### **RFD5500**

- Although the device is water and dust resistant, do not expose it to rain or moisture for an extended period of time. In general, treat the device as a pocket calculator or other small electronic instrument.
- Do not clean the device or expose it to rain or moisture when the battery is removed. Without the battery, the device is not water/dust sealed.
- Do not drop the device or subject it to strong impact.
- Protect the device from temperature extremes. Do not leave it on the dashboard of a car on a hot day, and keep it away from heat sources.
- Do not store or use the device in any location that is extremely dusty, damp, or wet.
- Do not use window cleaning solution. Use a soft cloth dampened with a 50/50 solution of isopropyl alcohol and water. See *Cleaning on page 7-1*.
- Do not allow the solution to form a pool of liquid anywhere on the screen or device.
- Do not use a large amount of solution to cause the device to remain wet.

#### **Battery**



WARNING!

Do not store the device with the battery installed. Doing so long term may cause irreversible harm to the battery. Always store the battery removed from the device. If a battery is installed during long term storage, it may discharge to point at which it cannot be recovered.

Even when stored separately from device it is important to follow industry standard guidelines. When batteries are stored over a year, battery cell manufacturers advise that some irreversible deterioration in overall battery quality may occur. To minimize this loss, they recommend storing batteries half charged in a dry, cool place between 41° and 77°F (5° and 25°C), the cooler the better. Batteries should be charged to half capacity at least once a year. In order to charge a battery to half capacity, take a fully discharged battery and charge it for two hours. If an electrolyte leakage is observed, avoid any contact with the affected area and properly dispose of the battery.
