

To determine the device serial number, touch (i) About phone > Status.



CHAPTER 1 GETTING STARTED

This chapter provides information for getting the device up and running for the first time.

Unpacking

- 1. Carefully remove all protective material from the TC70x/TC75x and save the shipping container for later storage and shipping.
- 2. Verify that the following were received:
 - · touch computer
 - 4,620 mAh PowerPercision+ Lithium-ion battery
 - Hand strap
 - · Regulatory Guide.
- 3. Inspect the equipment for damage. If any equipment is missing or damaged, contact the Global Customer Support center immediately.
- **4.** Prior to using the device for the first time, remove the protective shipping film that covers the scan window, display and camera window.

Features




Figure 1-1 Front View

3	PTT Button	Initiates push-to-talk communications (programmable).
4	Back Button	Displays the previous screen.

		On TC70x/TC75x with GMS, opens the Google Now screen when held for a short period of time.
6	Microphone	Use for communications in Handset mode.
7	Charging Contacts	Provides power to the device from cables and cradles.
8	Speaker	Provides audio output for video and music playback. Provides audio in speakerphone mode.
9	Search Button	Opens the Recent App screen.




Figure 1-2 Rear View

Setup

Perform this procedure to start using the TC70x/TC75x for the first time.

- 1. Install a SIM card (TC75x only).
- 2. Install a SAM card.
- 3. Install a micro secure digital (SD) card (optional).
- 4. Install hand strap (optional).
- 5. Install the battery.
- 6. Charge the device.
- 7. Power on the device.

Installing the SIM Card



NOTE TC75x only.



CAUTION For proper electrostatic discharge (ESD) precautions to avoid damaging the SIM card. Proper ESD precautions include, but not limited to, working on an ESD mat and ensuring that the user is properly grounded.



NOTE The TC75x may contain one mini SIM slot and two nano SIM slots. If using a micro SIM card, a third-party SIM adapter is required. By default, use a nano SIM card in slot 1.

1. Remove access cover.




Figure 1-3 TC75x SIM Slot Locations

2. Insert a SIM card into the SIM slot with the cut edge toward the middle of the device and the contacts facing down.




Figure 1-4 nano SIM Card Installation




Figure 1-5 Mini SIM Card Installation

3. Ensure that the SIM card is seated properly.

Installing the SAM Card



CAUTION For proper electrostatic discharge (ESD) precautions to avoid damaging the Secure Access Module (SAM) card. Proper ESD precautions include, but not limited to, working on an ESD mat and ensuring that the user is properly grounded.



NOTE The TC70x/TC75x contains one slot for a mini SAM card. If using a micro SAM card, a third-party adapter is required. On the TC75x, when using a SAM card, only a nano SIM card can be used.

- Remove access cover.
- 2. Insert a SAM card into the SAM slot with the cut edge toward the middle of the device and the contacts facing down.




Figure 1-6 SAM Card Installation

3. Ensure that the SAM card is seated properly.

Installing a microSD Card

The microSD card slot provides secondary non-volatile storage. The slot is located under the battery pack. Refer to the documentation provided with the card for more information, and follow the manufacturer's recommendations for use.



CAUTION Follow proper electrostatic discharge (ESD) precautions to avoid damaging the microSD card. Proper ESD precautions include, but are not limited to, working on an ESD mat and ensuring that the operator is properly grounded.

- 1. Remove the hand strap, if installed.
- 2. Lift the access door.




Figure 1-7 Lift Access Door

3. Insert the microSD card into the card holder door ensuring that the card slides into the holding tabs on each side of the door.




Figure 1-8 Insert microSD Card in Holder

4. Re-install the access door.

Installing the Hand Strap and Battery



NOTE Installation of the hand strap is optional. Skip this section if not installing the hand strap.

1. Remove the hand strap filler from the hand strap slot. Store the hand strap filler in a safe place for future replacement.




Figure 1-9 Remove Filler

2. Insert the hand strap plate into the hand strap slot.




Figure 1-10 Insert Hand Strap

3. Insert the battery, bottom first, into the battery compartment in the back of the TC70x/TC75x.




Figure 1-11 Insert Bottom of Battery into Battery Compartment

4. Press the battery down into the battery compartment until the battery release latches snap into place.




Figure 1-12 Press Down on Battery

5. Place hand strap clip into hand strap mounting slot and pull down until it snaps into place.




Figure 1-13 Secure Hand Strap Clip

Installing the Battery

1. Insert the battery, bottom first, into the battery compartment in the back of the TC70x/TC75x.




Figure 1-14 Insert Bottom of Battery into Battery Compartment

2. Press the battery down into the battery compartment until the battery release latches snap into place.




Figure 1-15 Press Down on Battery

Charging the Battery

Before using the TC70x/TC75x for the first time, charge the main battery until the green Charging/Notification light emitting diode (LED) remains lit. To charge the TC70x/TC75x, use a cable or a cradle with the appropriate power supply. For information about the accessories available for the TC70x/TC75x, see *Chapter 7, Accessories* for more information.

- · Snap-On USB Cable
- · Charging Cable Cup
- 2-Slot Charge Only Cradle
- 2-Slot USB/Ethernet Cradle
- 5-Slot Charge Only Cradle
- 5-Slot Ethernet Cradle
- Charge Only Vehicle Cradle
- Auto Charging Cable Cup.
- Serial Cable Cup

The 4,620 mAh battery fully charges in less than five hours at room temperature.

Charge batteries in temperatures from 0°C to 40°C (32°F to 104°F). The TC70x/TC75x or accessory always performs battery charging in a safe and intelligent manner. At higher temperatures (e.g. approximately +37°C (+98°F)) the TC70x/TC75x or accessory may for small periods of time alternately enable and disable battery charging to keep the battery at acceptable temperatures. The TC70x/TC75x or accessory indicates when charging is disabled due to abnormal temperatures via its LED.

- 1. To charge the main battery, connect the charging accessory to the appropriate power source.
- 2. Insert the TC70x/TC75x into a cradle or attach to a cable. The TC70x/TC75x turns on and begins charging. The Charging/Notification LED blinks amber while charging, then turns solid green when fully charged.

Charging Indicators

 Table 1-3
 Charging/Notification LED Charging Indicators

State	Indication
Off	The device is not charging. The device is not inserted correctly in the cradle or connected to a power source. Charger/cradle is not powered.
Slow Blinking Amber (1 blink every 4 seconds)	The device is charging.
Solid Green	Charging complete.
Fast Blinking Amber (2 blinks/second)	 Charging error, e.g.: Temperature is too low or too high. Charging has gone on too long without completion (typically eight hours).
Slow Blinking Red (1 blink every 4 seconds)	The device is charging but the battery is at end of useful life.
Solid Red	Charging complete but the battery is at end of useful life.
Fast Blinking Red (2 blinks/second)	 Charging error but the battery is at end of useful life., e.g.: Temperature is too low or too high. Charging has gone on too long without completion (typically eight hours).

Google Account Setup



NOTE Available only on devices with GMS software.

The TC70x/TC75x has to be connected to the internet, either through WAN (TC75x only) or Wi-Fi, in-order to set up a Google account.

The first time the TC70x/TC75x starts, the Setup Wizard displays. Follow the on-screen instructions to set up a Google account, configure Google Wallet for purchasing items from the Play Store, entering your personal information, and enabling backup/restore features.

Replacing the Battery



CAUTION Do not add or remove SIM, SAM or microSD card during battery replacement.

- 1. Remove any accessory attached to the device.
- 2. Press the Power button until the menu appears.
- 3. Touch Battery Swap.
- 4. Follow the on-screen instructions.
- 5. Wait for the LED to turn off.

6. If hand strap is attached, slide the hand strap clip up toward the top of the TC70x/TC75x and then lift.




Figure 1-16 Remove Hand Strap Clip

7. Press the two battery latches in.




Figure 1-17 Press Battery Latches

8. Lift the battery from the TC70x/TC75x.




Figure 1-18 Lift the Battery



CAUTION Replace the battery within two minutes. After two minutes the device reboots and data may be lost.

- **9.** Insert the replacement battery, bottom first, into the battery compartment in the back of the TC70x/TC75x.
- **10.** Press the battery down until the battery release latch snaps into place.
- 11. Replace the hand strap, if required.
- 12. Press and hold the Power button to turn on the TC70x/TC75x.

Replacing the SIM or SAM Card



NOTE SIM replacement applies to TC75x only.

To replace the SIM or SAM card:

- 1. Press and hold the Power button until the menu appears.
- 2. Touch Power off.
- 3. Touch OK.
- 4. If hand strap is attached, slide the hand strap clip up toward the top of the TC70x/TC75x and then lift.




Figure 1-19 Remove Hand Strap Clip

- 5. Press the two battery latches in.
- **6.** Lift the battery from the TC70x/TC75x.




Figure 1-20 Remove Access Door




Figure 1-21 Remove Mini SIM/SAM Card




Figure 1-22 Remove Nano SIM Card




Figure 1-23 Insert Mini SIM/SAM Card




Figure 1-24 Insert Nano SIM Card




Figure 1-25 Replace Access Door




Figure 1-26 Remove Hand Strap Clip




Figure 1-27 Remove Access Door




Figure 1-28 Replace Access Door

Battery Management



NOTE Prior to checking the battery charge level, remove the TC70x/TC75x from any AC power source (cradle or cable).

To check the charge status of the main battery, open Settings and touch (i) About phone > Battery Information.

Battery status indicates that the battery is discharging and Battery level lists the battery charge (as a percentage of fully charged).

Monitor Battery Usage

The **Battery** screen lists which applications consume the most battery power. Also use it to turn off applications that were downloaded if they are consuming too much power.

Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel and then touch ...



2. Touch Battery.




Figure 1-29 Battery Screen

The Battery screen lists the applications using the battery. The discharge graph at the top of the screen shows the rate of the battery discharge since last charged (short periods of time when connected to a charger are shown as thin green lines at the bottom of the chart), and how long it has been running on battery power.

Touch an application in the Battery screen to display details about its power consumption. Different applications display different information. Some applications include buttons that open screens with settings to adjust power use

Low Battery Notification

When the battery charge level drops below 18%, the TC70x/TC75x displays a notice to connect the TC70x/TC75x to power. The user should charge the battery using one of the charging accessories.




Figure 1-30 Low Battery Notification

When the battery charge drops below 10%, the TC70x/TC75x displays a notice to connect the TC70x/TC75x to power. The user must charge the battery using one of the charging accessories.

When the battery charge drops below 4%, the TC70x/TC75x turns off.

The user must charge the TC70x/TC75x using one of the charging accessories.

Battery Optimization

Observe the following battery saving tips:

- Disable DataWedge Launcher profile. Refer to the TC70x/TC75x Integrator Guide for Android Version 6.0.1 for instructions.
- Remove Snap-on accessories when not in use.
- Set the screen to turn off after a short period of non-use. See Setting Screen Timeout Setting on page 1-19.
- Reduce screen brightness. See Setting the Screen Brightness.
- Turn off all wireless radios when not in use. Note that the global positioning system (GPS) receiver is only turned on when a GPS application is using the GPS radio.
- Turn off automatic syncing for Email, Calendar, Contacts and other applications.
- Minimize use of applications that keep the TC70x/TC75x from suspending, for example, music, GPS and video applications.

Turning Off the Radios

To turn off all the radios:

- 1. Press the Power button until the menu appears.
- 2. Touch Airplane mode. The airplane icon appears in the Status bar indicating that all the radios are off.

Setting the Date and Time

The date and time is automatically synchronized using a NITZ server when the TC75x is connected to a cellular network. The user is only required to set the time zone or set the date and time when not connected to a cellular network or if the wireless LAN does not support Network Time Protocol (NTP).

Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel and then touch ...



- Touch U Date & time.
- Touch Automatic date & time to disable automatic date and time synchronization.
- Touch Set date. 4.
- Move the sliders up and down to select the month, date and year.
- Touch **Done**. 6.
- 7. Touch **Set time**.
- Move the sliders up and down to select the hour, minutes and part of the day.
- 9. Touch Done.
- 10. Touch Select time zone.
- 11. Select the current time zone from the list.

12. Touch **O**.

Display Setting

Use Display settings to change the screen brightness, change the background image, enable screen rotation, set sleep time and change font size.

Setting the Screen Brightness

To manually set the screen brightness:






Figure 1-33 Touch Panel Mode Dialog Box

Setting Notification LED

The Charging/Notification LED lights blue when an application, such as email and VoIP, generates a programmable notification or to indicate when the TC70x/TC75x is connected to a Bluetooth device. By default, LED notifications are enabled. To change the notification setting:




Figure 1-34 Sound and Notification Screen

Sound

- Media volume Controls the music, games and media volume.
- Alarm volume Controls the alarm clock volume.
- Ring volume Controls the ringtone volume.
- Also vibrate for calls Enable to make the device vibrate when a call is received (default enabled).
- **Interruptions** Use to prioritize sound notifications. Touch the settings to turn call and message interruptions on or off.

If user turns Messages notifications on, touch **Calls/messages from** to specify from whom to accept notifications (**Anyone**, **Starred contacts only** or **Contacts Only**).

In **Downtime** section, select which days and times to allow for sound notifications.

- Phone ringtone Touch to select a ringtone to sound when an incoming call is received.
- **Default notification ringtone** Touch to select a sound to play for all system notifications.
- Other sounds
 - **Dial pad tones** Check to play a sound when a phone key is touched (default enabled).
 - Screen locking sounds Check to play a sound when locking and unlocking the screen (default enabled)
 - Charging sounds Check to play a sound when the device begins charging.
 - Touch sounds Check to play a sound when making screen selections (default enabled).
 - Vibrate on touch Check to vibrate when making screen selections (default enabled).
- Cast screen Transmit whatever is on the screen to a supported TV.

Notification

- Pulse notification light Blinks LED when a notification exists.
- When device is locked Manage whether notifications can be seen when the TC70x/TC75x is locked. Options: Show all notification content (default) or Don't show notifications at all.
- App notification Modify the notification settings individually for an application. The setting under When device is locked always takes precedence over the setting for an individual application.
- Advanced
 - **Notification access** Displays which applications can access notifications. When a notification arrives, its icon appears at the top of the screen. Icons for pending notifications appear on the left, and system icons on the right.
 - Do Not Disturb access Displays which applications can access DO Not Disturb feature.

Wake-Up Sources

By default the TC70x/TC75x wakes from suspend mode when the user presses the power button. The TC70x/TC75x can be configured to wake when the user presses the PPT or Scan buttons on the left side of the device.

Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel and then touch ...



- Touch **Wake-Up Sources**.
- Touch **Keypad** checkbox. A check appears in the checkbox. 3.




Figure 1-35 Wake-Up Sources

CHAPTER 2 USING THE DEVICE

Introduction

This chapter explains the buttons, status icons, and controls on the TC70x/TC75x, and provides basic instructions for using the TC70x/TC75x including resetting the TC70x/TC75x and entering data.

Google Mobile Services



NOTE This section only applies to TC70x/TC75x configurations with Google Mobile Services (GMS).

The TC70x/TC75x with GMS contains applications and services that provide additional functionality to the TC70x/TC75x.

GMS includes:

- Applications GMS adds a variety of Google applications and associated widgets including Chrome, Gmail, Drive and Maps.
- · Services:
 - Speech to Text Allows for free format speech to text, in many languages for both connected and disconnected network. Launch by touching the microphone icon on the keyboard.
 - TalkBack Service Provides spoken feedback on various parts of the user interface. To enable, go to Settings > Accessibility.
 - Network Location Provider Adds a location provider which uses mobile network tower information and Wi-Fi access point information to provide a location without using GPS. To enable, go to Settings > Location access.
 - **Widevine DRM** Enables the digital rights management so that protected content can be played. Enable via DRM Info from the Play Store.
 - **Google Cloud Messaging** Allows the sending of data from your server to your TC70x/TC75x and also to receive messages from devices on the same connection.
 - Backup and Restore Allows the users settings and applications to be backed up to a Google server and subsequently restored from that server after a factory reset.

• **Google accounts** - Create and use a Google account to synchronize mail, files, music, photos, contacts and calendar events.

Home Screen

The Home screen displays when the TC70x/TC75x turns on. Depending upon the configuration, the Home screen might appear different. Contact your system administrator for more information.

After a suspend or screen time-out, the Home screen displays with the lock sliders. Touch the screen and slide up to unlock. For screen locking information see *Un-Locking the Screen on page 2-17*.





Managing Notifications

Notification icons report the arrival of new messages, calendar events, and alarms, as well as ongoing events. When a notification occurs, an icon appears in the Status bar with a brief description. See *Notification Icons on page 2-5* for a list of possible notification icons and their description. Open the Notifications panel to view a list of all the notifications.

To open the Notification panel drag the Status bar down from the top of the screen.




Figure 2-4 Notification Panel

To respond to a notification, open the Notifications Panel and then touch a notification. The Notifications Panel closes and the subsequent activity is dependent on the notification.

To clear all notifications, open the Notifications Panel and then touch \blacksquare . All event-based notifications are removed. Ongoing notifications remain in the list.

Ongoing notifications remain in the list.

To close the Notification Panel, swipe the Notifications Panel up.

Quick Settings

Use Quick Access Panel to get to frequently used settings, like turning on airplane mode. To open Quick Access Panel, swipe down from the top of the screen with two fingers or twice with one finger.




Figure 2-5 Quick Settings

To change a setting, just touch the icon:

- Display brightness: Slide to lower or increase the brightness of the screen.
- Wi-Fi network: Turn Wi-Fi on or off. To open Wi-Fi settings, touch the Wi-Fi network name.
- Bluetooth settings: Turn Bluetooth on or off. To open Bluetooth settings, touch the **Bluetooth**.
- Do not disturb: Control how and when to receive notifications.
- Cellular: Turns cellular radio on or off. To open Cellular settings, touch (TC75x only)
- Airplane mode: Turn airplane mode on or off. Airplane mode means device will not connect to Wi-Fi or Bluetooth.
- Auto-rotate: Lock the device's orientation in portrait or landscape mode or set to automatically rotate.
- · Flashlight: Turn camera flash on or off.
- Location: Enable or disable locationing feature.

Using the Touchscreen

Use the multi-tap sensitive screen to operate the device.

- **Tap** Tap to:
 - · select items on the screen
 - · type letters and symbols using the on-screen keyboard
 - press on-screen buttons.

- Tap and Hold Tap and hold:
 - an item on the Home screen to move it to a new location or to the trash.
 - an item in Apps to create a shortcut on the Home screen.
 - the Home screen to open a menu for customizing the Home screen.
 - an empty area on the Home screen until the menu appears.
- Drag Tap and hold an item for a moment and then move finger on the screen until reaching the new position.
- Swipe- Move finger up and down or left and right on the screen to:
 - · unlock the screen
 - · view additional Home screens
 - view additional application icons in the Launcher window
 - · view more information on an application's screen.
- Double-tap Tap twice on a web page, map, or other screen to zoom in and out.
- **Pinch** In some applications, zoom in and out by placing two fingers on the screen and pinching them together (to zoom out) or spreading them apart (to zoom in).

Keyboards

The device has two types of keyboards:

- · Enterprise Keyboard
- Android Keyboard (default).

To switch between keyboards:

- 1. Touch in a text box to display the current keyboard.
- **2.** On the Enterprise keyboard, touch and hold 🏈 or on the Android keyboard, touch and hold 🏶.




Figure 2-6 Change Keyboard Dialog Box




Figure 2-7 Numeric Keyboard

Using the Android Keyboard

Editing Text

Edit entered text and use menu commands to cut, copy, and paste text within or across applications. Some applications do not support editing some or all of the text they display; others may offer their own way to select text.

Entering Numbers, Symbols and Special Characters

To enter numbers and symbols:

- Touch and hold one of the top-row keys until a menu appears then select a number. Keys with alternate characters display an ellipsis (...) below the character.
- Touch and hold the Shift key with one finger, touch one or more capital letters or symbols to enter them, and then lift both fingers to return to the lowercase keyboard.
- Touch to switch to the numbers and symbols keyboard.
- Touch the *** key on the numbers and symbols keyboard to view additional symbols.

To enter special characters, touch and hold a number or symbol key to open a menu of additional symbols.

- A larger version of the key displays briefly over the keyboard.
- Keys with alternate characters display an ellipsis (...) below the character.




Figure 2-12 APPS Window Example




Figure 2-13 Recently Used Applications

Un-Locking the Screen

Use the Lock screen to protect access to data on the TC70x/TC75x. Some email account require locking the screen. Refer to the TC70x/TC75x Integrator Guide for Android Version 6.0.1 for information on setting up the locking feature. The Locking feature functions differently in Single User mode or Multiple User mode.

When locked, a pattern, PIN or password is required to unlock the device. Press the Power button to lock the screen. The device also locks after a pre-defined time-out.

Press and release the Power button to wake the device.

The Lock screen displays. Slide (a) to the right toward (b) to unlock the screen.

If the Pattern screen unlock feature is enabled, the Pattern screen appears instead of the Lock screen.

If the PIN or Password screen unlock feature is enabled, enter the PIN or password after unlocking the screen.




Figure 2-16 Pattern Screen




Figure 2-17 Password Screen

Interactive Sensor Technology

The TC70x/TC75x contains sensors that monitor movement, orientation and ambient light:

- Gyroscope Measures angular rotational velocity to detect rotation of the device.
- · Accelerometer Measures the linear acceleration of movement to detect the orientation of the device.
- Digital Compass The digital compass or magnetometer provides simple orientation in relation to the Earth's magnetic field. As a result, the device always knows which way is North so it can auto rotate your digital maps depending on your physical orientation.
- · Light Sensor Used to detect ambient light and adjust the screen brightness.
- Proximity Sensor Uses to detect presence of nearby objects without physical contact.

In order to take advantage of these sensors, applications use API commands. Refer to the Zebra Android EMDK for more information.

Resetting the Device

There are two reset functions, soft reset and hard reset.

Performing a Soft Reset

Perform a soft reset if applications stop responding.

- 1. Press and hold the Power button until the menu appears.
- 2. Touch Reset.
- 3. The device reboots.

Performing a Hard Reset



CAUTION Performing a hard reset with a SD card installed in the TC70x/TC75x may cause damage or data corruption to the SD card.

Perform a hard reset if the TC70x/TC75x stops responding.

- 1. Simultaneously press the Power, Scan and Volume Up buttons for at least four seconds.
- 2. When the screen turns off, release the buttons.
- 3. The TC70x/TC75x reboots.

Suspend Mode

The TC70x/TC75x goes into suspend mode when the user presses the Power button or after a period of inactivity (set in the Display settings window).

To wake the TC70x/TC75x from Suspend mode, press the Power button.

The Lock screen displays. Slide to the right toward to unlock the screen. If the Pattern screen unlock feature is enabled, the Pattern screen appears instead of the Lock screen. See *Un-Locking the Screen on page 2-17*.



NOTE If the user enters the PIN, password or pattern incorrectly five times, they must wait 30 seconds before trying again.

If the user forgets the PIN, password or pattern contact the system administrator.

CHAPTER 3 CALLS



NOTE TC75x only.

Make a phone call from the **Phone** application, the **Contacts** application or other applications or widgets that display contact information.

Emergency Calling

The service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers, such as 911 or 999, that the user can call under any circumstances, even when the phone is locked, a SIM card is not inserted or the phone is not activated. The service provider can program additional emergency numbers into the SIM card. However, the SIM card must be inserted in the device in order to use the numbers stored on it. See the service provider for additional information.



NOTE Emergency numbers vary by country. The phone's pre-programmed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

Audio Modes

The device offers three audio modes for use during phone calls:

- **Handset Mode:** Switches audio to the receiver at the top front of the device, so the user can use the device as a handset. This is the default mode.
- Speaker Mode: Use the device as if on speaker phone.
- Headset Mode: Connect a Bluetooth or wired headset to automatically switch audio to the headset.

Using a Bluetooth Headset

Use a Bluetooth headset for audio communication when using an audio-enabled application. See *Bluetooth on page 6-10* for information on connecting a Bluetooth headset to the device. Set the volume appropriately before putting on the headset. When a Bluetooth headset is connected, the speakerphone is muted.

Using a Wired Headset

Use a wired headset and Audio Adapter for audio communication when using an audio-enabled application. Set the volume appropriately before putting on the headset. When a wired headset is connected, the speakerphone is muted.

To end a call using the wired headset, press and hold the headset button until the call ends.




Figure 3-1 3.5 mm Headset Adapter

Adjusting Audio Volume

Use the Volume buttons to adjust the volume of the ringer when not in a call and the audio volume when in a call.



NOTE Adjust the conversation phone volume during a call. Adjusting the volume while not in a call affects the ring and notification sound levels.

Making a Call Using the Dialer

Use the dialer tab to dial phone numbers.

- 1. On the Home screen touch **\lambda**.




Figure 3-2 Dialer Screen




Figure 3-3 Call in Progress




Figure 3-4 Bluetooth Audio Options

Dialer Dialing Options

The dialer provides options to save the dialed number to contacts, insert pauses and wait into the dial string and options for setting the Call settings. Enter at least one digit to access these options. Touch to access the following.

- Add 2-sec pause pause the dialing of the next number for two seconds. Multiple pauses can be added sequentially.
- Add wait wait for confirmation to send the rest of the digits.

Making a Call Using Contacts

There are two ways to make a call using contacts:

- · Using the Dialer
- Using the Contacts application.

Using the Dialer

- 1. On the Home screen touch **\lambda**.
- 2. Touch the 🚢 tab.




Figure 3-5 Dialer Contacts Tab




Figure 3-6 Contact Application




Figure 3-7 Contact Information

Arrow icons beside a call indicate the type of call. Multiple arrows indicate multiple calls:

- **L** Missed incoming call
- **L** Received incoming call
- I Outgoing call.
- 1. On the Home screen touch 📞
- 2. Touch the O tab.




Figure 3-8 Call History Tab




Figure 3-9 Two Calls




Figure 3-10 Merged Calls




Figure 3-11 Un-merge Calls

Answering Calls

When you receive a phone call, the **Incoming Call** screen displays, displaying the caller ID and any additional information about the caller that is in the **Contacts** application.




Figure 3-12 Incoming Call Screen

Touch Answer to answer the call or Dismiss to send the caller to voice mail.

If the screen lock is enabled, the user can still answer the call without unlocking the device.




Figure 3-13 Incoming Call Locked Screen

When a call arrives, touch the white phone icon and slide over one of these icons:

- Answer call Start talking to the caller.
- Send to voice mail Direct the caller to leave a voice mail message.
- E Send a message Opens a list of quick text responses. Touch one to send it to the caller immediately.

When the calls ends, the device remains locked.

If using a Bluetooth headset, when a call arrives, touch the Call button on the Bluetooth headset to answer the call. To end the call press the headset Call button.

All incoming calls are recorded in the Phone application Call log tab. If you miss a call, you receive a notification. To silence the ringer before answering the call, press the volume down button on the side of device.

Call Settings



NOTE Not all options are available for all configurations.

Use the Call Settings to modify options related to the phone call feature.

- · Display options
 - Sort by Options: First name or Last name.
 - Name format Options: First name first or Last name first.
- · Sounds and vibrations
 - Phone ringtone Touch to select a ringtone to sound when an incoming call is received.
 - Also vibrate for calls Check to make the device vibrate when a call is received (default disabled).
 - Dialpad tones Check to play a sound when a phone key is touched (default enabled).
- Quick responses Touch to edit quick responses to use instead of answering a call.
- Speed dial settings Set speed dial contact shortcuts.
- Calls
 - Calling accounts
 - SIP accounts Choose to receive Internet calls for accounts added to the device, view or change SIP accounts, or add an Internet calling account.
 - Use SIP calling Options: For all calls or Only for SIP calls (default).
 - Receive incoming calls When enabled, allows incoming calls (default disabled).
 - **Display duration** When enabled, displays the duration of the call (default enabled).
 - **Vibrating after connected** When enabled, the device vibrates after connecting to the SIP call (default enabled).
 - Turn on proximity sensor When enabled, the screen turn off to save power. (default enabled)
 - Voicemail Touch to configure voicemail settings.
 - Service Set the service provider or other provider for voicemail service.
 - Setup Touch to update the phone number used to access voicemail.
 - Sound Touch to select a sound to play when a voicemail is received.
 - Vibrate Set vibrate option. (default disabled).
 - **Fixed Dialing Numbers** Use Fixed Dialing to restrict the phone to dial only the phone number(s) or area code(s) specified in a Fixed Dialing list.
 - GSM call settings
 - Call forwarding Use call forwarding to forward incoming calls to a different phone number.



NOTE Call Forwarding may not be available on all networks. Check with the service provider for availability.

Additional settings

- Caller ID Enable caller ID to reveal the identity of the person making an outgoing call. Options: Network default (default), Hide number, Show number.
- Call waiting set to be notified of an incoming call while on a call.
- **Call barring** Use call barring to block certain types of incoming and/or outgoing calls. Select the type of incoming and/or outgoing calls to block.

Accessibility

• **TTY mode** - Touch to set the TTY setting. Use an optional teletypewriter (TTY) device with the TC75x to send and receive calls. Plug the TTY device into the TC75x headset jack and set the TC75x to operate in one of the TTY modes.



NOTE Use a TSB-121 compliant cable (provided by the TTY manufacturer) to connect the TTY device to the TC75x.

Set the TC75x volume to a middle level setting for proper operation. If you experience a high number of incorrect characters, adjust the volume as needed to minimize the error rate.

For optimal performance, the TC75x should be at least 30 cm (12 inches) from the TTY device. Placing the TC75x too close to the TTY device may cause high error rates.

- TTY off (default) TTY is off.
- TTY Full Transmit and receive TTY characters.
- TTY HCO Transmit TTY characters but receive by listening to earpiece.
- TTY VCO Receive TTY characters but transmit by speaking into microphone.

Battery Manager

 - Battery manufacture date Lists the date of manufacture.
 - Battery serial number Lists the battery serial number. The number matches the serial number printed on the battery label.
 - Battery part number Lists the battery part number.
 - Backup battery level Indicates the current backup battery charge level as a percentage.
 - Battery rated capacity Lists the rated capacity of the backup battery in mAh.
 - Battery decommission status Indicates if the battery is past it's life span.
 - Battery Good Battery is in good health.
 - Decommissioned Battery Battery is past it's useful life and should be replaced.
 - Base cumulative charge Indicates the total amount of charge applied to the battery.
 - Battery usage number Indicates the number of charge cycles of the battery.
 - **Usage decommission threshold** Lists the threshold charge cycle count. When the Battery usage number reaches this value the battery should be decommissioned.
 - App version Lists the application version number.

Use the File Browser application to view and mange files on the device.

- Information View detailed information about the file or folder.




Figure 4-3 New Text Message Screen




Figure 4-4 New Multimedia Message Screen






Figure 4-5 Camera Mode




Figure 4-7 Video Mode

- Picture quality Touch to select picture quality setting. Options: Low, Standard (default) or High.
- Countdown timer Options: Off (default), 2 seconds, 5 seconds or 10 seconds.
- Storage Touch to select location to store the photo. Options: Phone or SD Card.
- Continuous Shot Select to enable or disable Options: On or Off (default).
- Face Detection Select to enable face detection. Options: Off (default) or On.
- ISO Set how sensitive the camera is to light. Options: Auto (default), ISO Auto (HJR), ISO100, ISO200, ISO400, ISO800 or ISO1600.
- Exposure Touch to adjust the exposure settings. Options: +2, +1, 0(default), -1 or -2.
- White balance Touch to select how Camera adjusts colors in different kinds of light, to achieve the most natural-looking colors.
 - Incandescent Adjust the white balance for incandescent lighting.
 - Fluorescent Adjust the white balance for florescent lighting.
 - δ^A Auto Adjust the white balance automatically (default).
 - **Daylight** Adjust the white balance for daylight.
 - Cloudy Adjust the white balance for a cloudy environment.
- Focus mode Touch to select the camera focus setting. Options: Auto, Infinity, Macro or CAF (Continuous Auto Focus) (default).
- ZSL Set the camera to immediately take a picture when the button is pressed (default enabled)

Front Camera

Touch (to display the photo setting options.

- Picture size Touch to set the size (in pixels) of the photo. Options: 1.3M pixels (default), WXGA, HD720, 1M pixels, SVGA, WVGA, 720 x 480, VGA, CIF or QVGA or QCIF.
- Picture quality Touch to select picture quality setting. Options: Low, Standard (default) or High.
- Countdown timer Options: Off (default), 2 seconds, 5 seconds or 10 seconds.
- Storage Touch to select location to store the photo. Options: Phone or SD Card.

Video Settings

When in Video mode, video settings are displayed on screen. Touch 🌣 to display the video settings options.




Figure 4-9 Gallery — Albums View




Figure 4-12 Cropping Tool




Figure 4-13 DataWedge Demonstration Window




Figure 4-14 Sound Recorder Application

PTT Express Voice Client



NOTE PTT Express Voice Client creates Push-To-Talk (PTT) communication capability between disparate enterprise devices. Leveraging existing Wireless Local Area Network (WLAN) infrastructure, PTT Express delivers simple PTT communication without the need of a voice communication server.

- Group Call: Press and hold the PTT (Talk) button to start communicating with other voice client users.
- **Private Response**: Double-press the PTT button to respond to the originator of the last broadcast or to make a Private Response.

PTT Audible Indicators

The following tones provide helpful cues when using the voice client.

- **Talk Tone**: Double chirp. Plays when the Talk button is depressed. This is a prompt for the user to start talking.
- Access Tone: Single beep. Plays when another user just finished a broadcast or response. The user is now able to initiate a Group Broadcast or Private Response.
- **Busy Tone**: Continuous tone. Plays when the Talk button is depressed and another user is already communicating on the same talkgroup. Plays after the maximum allowed talk time is reached (60 seconds).
- Network Tone:
 - Three increasing pitch beeps. Plays when PTT Express has acquired the WLAN connection and the service is enabled.




Figure 4-15 PTT Express Default User Interface




Figure 4-16 PTT Buttons

Its information tracking includes the following: CPU load, memory load, memory snapshots, battery consumption, power states, wireless logging, cellular logging, TCP dumps, Bluetooth logging, GPS logging, logcat, FTP push/pull, ANR dumps, etc. All logs and files generated are saved onto flash storage on the device (internal or external).




Figure 4-17 RxLogger




Figure 4-18 Elemez Application

Imaging

The TC70x/TC75x with an integrated 2D imager has the following features:

- Omnidirectional reading of a variety of bar code symbologies, including the most popular linear, postal, PDF417, and 2D matrix code types.
- The ability to capture and download images to a host for a variety of imaging applications.
- Advanced intuitive laser aiming cross-hair and dot aiming for easy point-and-shoot operation.

The imager uses imaging technology to take a picture of a bar code, stores the resulting image in its memory, and executes state-of-the-art software decoding algorithms to extract the bar code data from the image.

Operational Modes

The TC70x/TC75x with an integrated imager supports two modes of operation, listed below. Activate each mode by pressing the Scan button.

• **Decode Mode**: In this mode, the TC70x/TC75x attempts to locate and decode enabled bar codes within its field of view. The imager remains in this mode as long as the user holds the scan button, or until it decodes a bar code.



NOTE To enable Pick List Mode, configure in DataWedge or set in an application using a API command.

• **Pick List Mode**: This mode allows the user to selectively decode a bar code when more than one bar code is in the TC70x/TC75x's field of view. To accomplish this, move the aiming crosshair or dot over the required bar code to decode only this bar code. This feature is ideal for pick lists containing multiple bar codes and manufacturing or transport labels containing more than one bar code type (either 1D or 2D).

RS507 Hands-Free Imager

The RS507 Hands-free Imager is a wearable bar code scan solution for both 1D and 2D bar code symbologies. The scanner supports Bluetooth Human Interface Device (HID) connection to the device.




Figure 5-3 DS3678 Digital Scanner

Scanning Considerations

Typically, scanning is a simple matter of aim, scan, and decode and a few quick trial efforts master it. However, consider the following to optimize scanning performance:

- Range: Any scanning device decodes well over a particular working range minimum and maximum
 distances from the bar code. This range varies according to bar code density and scanning device optics.
 Scanning within range brings quick and constant decodes; scanning too close or too far away prevents
 decodes. Move the scanner closer and further away to find the right working range for the bar codes being
 scanned.
- Angle: Scanning angle is important for promoting quick decodes. When laser beams reflect directly back into
 the scanner from the bar code, this specular reflection can "blind" the scanner. To avoid this, scan the bar
 code so that the beam does not bounce directly back. But don't scan at too sharp an angle; the scanner
 needs to collect scattered reflections from the scan to make a successful decode. Practice quickly shows
 what tolerances to work within.
- Hold the TC70x/TC75x farther away for larger symbols
- Move the TC70x/TC75x closer for symbols with bars that are close together.



NOTE Scanning procedures depend on the application and TC70x/TC75x configuration. An application may use different scanning procedures from the one listed above.

Bar Code Scanning with Internal Imager

To read a bar code, a scan-enabled application is required. The TC70x/TC75x contains the DataWedge application that allows the user to enable the imager, decode the bar code data and display the bar code content.

- 1. Ensure that an application is open on the TC70x/TC75x and a text field is in focus (text cursor in text field).
- 2. Point the exit window on the top of the TC70x/TC75x at a bar code.




Figure 5-4 Imager Scanning




Figure 5-5 Internal Imager Aiming Pattern




Figure 5-7 Bar Code Scanning with RS507




Figure 5-8 RS507 Aiming Pattern




Figure 5-9 RS507 Pick List Mode with Multiple Bar Codes in Aiming Pattern




Figure 5-10 Bar Code Scanning with RS6000




Figure 5-11 RS6000 Aiming Pattern




Figure 5-12 RS6000 Pick List Mode with Multiple Bar Codes in Aiming Pattern




Figure 5-13 Bar Code Scanning with DS3678 (-SR shown)




Figure 5-16 Align NFC Antennas




Figure 5-18 Align NFC Antennas

- Touch **Bluetooth**.
- Touch SCAN FOR DEVICES. The TC70x/TC75x begins searching for discoverable Bluetooth devices in the area and displays them under AVAILABLE DEVICES.
- 10. Scroll through the list and select RS507 or RS6000.

The TC70x/TC75x connects to the RS507/RS6000 and Connected appears below the device name. The Bluetooth device is added to the **Bluetooth devices** list and a trusted ("paired") connection is established.

A notification appears on the screen and the A icon appears in the Status bar.

Pairing the DS3678 Digital Scanner

To connect the DS3678 Digital Scanner to the TC70x/TC75x using Bluetooth Human Interface Device (HID) Mode.

Pairing Using Bluetooth Human Interface Device

To pair the DS3678 with the TC70x/TC75x using HID:

- 1. Remove the battery from the DS3678 scanner.
- Replace the battery.
- After the DS3678 reboots, scan the bar code below to place the DS3678 in HID mode.

4. On the TC70x/TC75x, swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel and then touch .

- 5. Touch * Bluetooth.
- **6.** Touch **SCAN FOR DEVICES**. The TC70x/TC75x begins searching for discoverable Bluetooth devices in the area and displays them under **Available devices**.
- 7. Scroll through the list and select DS3678 xxxxxx, where xxxxxx is the serial number.

The TC70x/TC75x connects to the DS3678, the DS3678 beeps once and **Connected** appears below the device name. The Bluetooth device is added to the **Bluetooth devices** list and a trusted ("paired") connection is established.

DataWedge

DataWedge is a utility that adds advanced bar code scanning capability to any application without writing code. It runs in the background and handles the interface to built-in bar code scanners. The captured bar code data is converted to keystrokes and sent to the target application as if it was typed on the keypad.


To configure DataWedge refer to the TC70x/TC75x Integrator Guide for Android Version 6.0.1.

Enabling DataWedge

- 1. Touch > ...
- 2. Touch > Settings.
- 3. Touch the **DataWedge enabled** checkbox. A blue checkmark appears in the checkbox indicating that DataWedge is enabled.
- 4. Touch O.

Disabling DataWedge

- 1. Touch > .
- 2. Touch > Settings.
- 3. Touch the **DataWedge enabled** checkbox. The blue checkmark disappears from the checkbox indicating that DataWedge is disabled.
- 4. Touch O.

Wireless Wide Area Networks



NOTE TC75x only.

Use Wireless wide area networks (WWANs) to access data over a cellular network. This section provides information on:

- · Sharing a data connection
- · Disabling data roaming
- Monitoring data usage
- · Limiting connections to 2G networks
- · Locking a SIM card
- Editing Access Point Names (APNs).

Sharing the Mobile Data Connection

The **tethering & portable hotspot** settings allow you to share your data connection. You can share the TC75x's mobile data connection with a single computer via USB tethering or Bluetooth tethering. You can also share the data connection with up to eight devices at once, by turning it into a portable Wi-Fi hotspot. While the TC75x is sharing its data connection, an icon appears at the top of the screen and a corresponding message appears in the notification list.

USB Tethering



NOTE USB tethering is not supported on computers running Mac OS. If your computer is running Windows 7 or a recent version of Linux (such as Ubuntu), follow these instructions without any special preparation. If running a version of Windows that precedes Windows 7, or some other operating system, you may need to prepare the computer to establish a network connection via USB.

1. Connect the TC75x to a host computer with the USB cable.

A USB icon appears at the top of the screen, and the notification Connected as a media device or **Connected as a camera** appears briefly at the top of the screen.

2. Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel and then touch ...



- 3. Touch More
- 4. Touch Tethering & portable hotspot.
- 5. Touch the USB tethering.

The host computer is now sharing the TC75x's data connection.

To stop sharing the data connection, touch the **USB tethering** switch again or disconnect the USB cable.

Bluetooth Tethering

Use Bluetooth tethering to share the data connection with a host computer.

Configure the host computer to obtain its network connection using Bluetooth. For more information, see the host computer's documentation.

- **1.** Pair the TC75x with the host computer.
- Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel and then touch ...



- Touch More ... > Tethering & portable hotspot.
- Touch the **Bluetooth tethering** switch to enable.

The host computer is now sharing the TC75x's data connection.

To stop sharing the data connection, touch the **Bluetooth tethering** switch again.

Portable Wi-Fi Hotspot

Configure the Wi-Fi Hotspot settings.

1. Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel and then touch ...



- 2. Touch More ... > Tethering & portable hotspot.
- 3. Touch the **Portable Wi-Fi hotspot** switch to enable.

After a moment, the TC75x starts broadcasting its Wi-Fi network name (SSID), so you can connect to it with up to eight computers or other devices. The Hotspot 🔘 icon appears in the Status Bar.

To stop sharing the data connection, touch the **Portable Wi-Fi hotspot** switch again.

Configuring the Wi-Fi Hotspot

1. Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel and then touch ...








Figure 6-1 Set up Wi-Fi Hotspot Dialog Box

- 3. In the **Network name** text field, edit the name for the hotspot.
- 4. In the Select AP Band drop-down list, select 2.4 GHz Band.
- 5. Touch the **Channel** option and select a channel number from the drop-down list.
- 6. Touch the **Security** option and select a security method from the drop-down list.
 - None
 - WPA2 PSK
- 7. In the Password text field, enter a password.



NOTE If **None** is selected in the **Security** option, a password is not required.

8. Touch Save.

Cellular Network Settings

Disabling Data When Roaming

To prevent the device from transmitting data over other carriers' mobile networks when leaving an area that is covered by the carrier's networks. This is useful for controlling expenses if the service plan does not include data roaming.

CDMA Devices

- 1. Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel and then touch ...
- 2. Touch More ... > Cellular networks > Data roaming access.




Figure 6-2 Data Roaming Access Dialog Box

3. Select the roaming option and then touch **OK**.

GSM Devices

- 1. Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel and then touch ...
- 2. Touch More ... > Cellular networks > Data roaming access.
- 3. Slide the **Data roaming** switch to the off position.

Preferred Network Type

Use to change the network operating mode.

- 1. Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel and then touch ...
- 2. Touch More ... > Cellular Networks > Preferred network type.
- In the Preferred network type dialog box, select a mode to set as default. Options: LTE only, Automatic or CDMA only.
- 4. Touch O.

Enhanced 4G LTE Mode

Use LTE services to improve voice and other communication. (default - disabled).

Search for MicroCell

A MicroCell acts like a mini cell tower is a building or residence and connects to an existing broadband Internet service. It improves cell signal performance for voice calls, texts, and cellular data applications like picture messaging and Web surfing.

Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel and then touch ...



Touch More ... > Cellular Networks > Search for MicroCell.

System Select

Use **System select** to change the CDMA roaming mode.

1. Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel and then touch ...



- 2. Touch More ... > Cellular Networks > System select.
- 3. In the **System select** dialog box, select a mode. Options:.
 - Home only Do not roam from Home network.
 - Automatic Allow automatic roaming.
- 4. Touch O.

Editing the Access Point Name



NOTE Many service provider Access Point Name (APN) data are pre-configured in the device. The APN information for all other service provides must be obtained from the wireless service provider.

To use the data on a network the user must configure the APN information.

1. Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel and then touch ...



- 2. Touch More ... > Cellular networks > Access Point Names.
- Touch an APN name in the list to edit an existing APN or touch ⊕ to create a new APN.
- Touch each APN setting and enter the appropriate data obtained from the wireless service provider.
- 5. When finished, touch 1.
- 6. Touch Save.
- Touch the radio button next to the APN name to start using it.
- Touch O.

Locking the SIM Card

Locking the SIM card requires the user to enter a PIN every time the device is turned on. If the correct PIN is not entered, only Emergency calls can be made.

1. Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel and then touch ...



- 2. Touch **Security**.
- 3. Touch Set up SIM/RUIM card lock.
- Touch Lock SIM card.




Figure 6-3 Enter PIN to Lock SIM Card

- 5. Enter the PIN associated with the card. Touch OK.
- Reset the device.

Data Usage

1. Data usage refers to the amount of data uploaded or downloaded by the TC75x during a given period. Depending on the wireless plan, you may be charged additional fees when your data usage exceeds your plan's limit. To monitor your data usage, swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel and then touch .



CAUTION The usage displayed on the data usage settings screen is measured by your device. Your carrier's data usage accounting may differ. Usage in excess of your carrier plan's data limits can result in steep overage charges. The feature described here can help you track your usage, but is not guaranteed to prevent additional charges.

Data usage settings allow you to:

- Set the data usage level at which you'll receive a warning.
- · Set a data usage limit.
- · View or restrict data usage by app.
- Identify mobile hotspots and restrict background downloads that may result in extra charges.

By default, when you open the data usage settings screen you see the settings for mobile data: that is, the data network or networks provided by your carrier:




Figure 6-4 Data Usage Screen

To display Wi-Fi data usage settings in a separate tab touch > Show Wi-Fi.

Just below the on-off switch, note the data usage cycle. Touch it to choose a different cycle. This date range is the period of time for which the graph displays data usage.

The vertical white lines on the graph show a period of time within the data usage cycle. This range determines the usage amount displayed just below the graph. Drag lines to change the period.

Set Data Usage Warning

Drag the orange line by its right side to the level where you want to receive a warning. When your data usage reaches this level, you'll receive a notification.

Set Auto-Sync

You can also conserve data usage by syncing your apps manually, only when you need the data, rather than relying on auto-sync. To turn auto-sync off or on, touch > Restrict background data.

Wireless Local Area Networks

Wireless local area networks (WLANs) allow the TC70x/TC75x to communicate wirelessly inside a building. Before using the TC70x/TC75x on a WLAN, the facility must be set up with the required hardware to run the WLAN (sometimes known as infrastructure). The infrastructure and the TC70x/TC75x must both be properly configured to enable this communication.

Refer to the documentation provided with the infrastructure (access points (APs), access ports, switches, Radius servers, etc.) for instructions on how to set up the infrastructure.

Once the infrastructure is set up to enforce the chosen WLAN security scheme, use the **Wireless & networks** settings configure the TC70x/TC75x to match the security scheme.

The TC70x/TC75x supports the following WLAN security options:

- Open
- · Wireless Equivalent Privacy (WEP).
- Wi-Fi Protected Access (WPA)/WPA2 Personal (PSK).
- Extensible Authentication Protocol (EAP).

The **Status** bar displays icons that indicate Wi-Fi network availability and Wi-Fi status. See Status Bar for more information.



NOTE Turn off Wi-Fi when not using it, to extend the life of the battery.

Scan and Connect to a Wi-Fi Network

1. Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel.




Figure 6-5 Quick Access Panel

Touch WLAN to open the WLAN screen. The TC70x/TC75x searches for WLANs in the area and lists them.

- 3. Scroll through the list and select the desired WLAN network.
- 4. For open networks, touch profile once or press and hold and then select Connect to network or for secure networks enter the required password or other credentials then touch Connect. See the system administrator for more information.
 - The TC70x/TC75x obtains a network address and other required information from the network using the dynamic host configuration protocol (DHCP) protocol. To configure the TC70x/TC75x with a fixed internet protocol (IP) address, refer to the TC70x/TC75x Integrator Guide for Android Version 6.0.1.
- 5. In the Wi-Fi setting field, Connected appears indicating that the TC70x/TC75x is connected to the WLAN.

Remove a Wi-Fi Network

To remove a remembered or connected network:

1. Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel and then touch ...



- 2. Touch Wi-Fi.
- 3. In the Wi-Fi list, touch and hold the name of the network.
- In the menu, touch Forget network.
- 5. Touch O.

Bluetooth

Bluetooth-equipped devices can communicate without wires, using frequency-hopping spread spectrum (FHSS) radio frequency (RF) to transmit and receive data in the 2.4 GHz Industry Scientific and Medical (ISM) band (802.15.1). Bluetooth wireless technology is specifically designed for short-range (10 meters (32.8 feet)) communication and low power consumption.

Devices with Bluetooth capabilities can exchange information (e.g., files, appointments, and tasks) with other Bluetooth enabled devices such as printers, access points, and other mobile devices.

The TC70x/TC75x support Bluetooth Low Energy. Bluetooth Low Energy is targeted at applications in the healthcare, fitness, security, and home entertainment industries. It provides reduced power consumption and cost while maintaining standard Bluetooth range.

Adaptive Frequency Hopping

Adaptive Frequency Hopping (AFH) is a method of avoiding fixed frequency interferers, and can be used with Bluetooth voice. All devices in the piconet (Bluetooth network) must be AFH-capable in order for AFH to work. There is no AFH when connecting and discovering devices. Avoid making Bluetooth connections and discoveries during critical 802.11b communications. AFH for Bluetooth consists of four main sections:

- Channel Classification A method of detecting an interference on a channel-by-channel basis, or pre-defined channel mask.
- Link Management Coordinates and distributes the AFH information to the rest of the Bluetooth network.
- Hop Sequence Modification Avoids interference by selectively reducing the number of hopping channels.
- Channel Maintenance A method for periodically re-evaluating the channels.

When AFH is enabled, the Bluetooth radio "hops around" (instead of through) the 802.11b high-rate channels. AFH coexistence allows Enterprise devices to operate in any infrastructure.

The Bluetooth radio in this device operates as a Class 2 device power class. The maximum output power is 2.5 mW and the expected range is 10 meters (32.8 ft.). A definition of ranges based on power class is difficult to obtain due to power and device differences, and whether one measures open space or closed office space.



NOTE It is not recommended to perform Bluetooth wireless technology inquiry when high rate 802.11b operation is required.

Security

The current Bluetooth specification defines security at the link level. Application-level security is not specified. This allows application developers to define security mechanisms tailored to their specific need. Link-level security occurs between devices, not users, while application-level security can be implemented on a per-user basis. The Bluetooth specification defines security algorithms and procedures required to authenticate devices, and if needed, encrypt the data flowing on the link between the devices. Device authentication is a mandatory feature of Bluetooth while link encryption is optional.

Pairing of Bluetooth devices is accomplished by creating an initialization key used to authenticate the devices and create a link key for them. Entering a common personal identification number (PIN) in the devices being paired generates the initialization key. The PIN is never sent over the air. By default, the Bluetooth stack responds with no key when a key is requested (it is up to user to respond to the key request event). Authentication of Bluetooth devices is based-upon a challenge-response transaction. Bluetooth allows for a PIN or passkey used to create other 128-bit keys used for security and encryption. The encryption key is derived from the link key used to

authenticate the pairing devices. Also worthy of note is the limited range and fast frequency hopping of the Bluetooth radios that makes long-distance eavesdropping difficult.

Recommendations are:

- Perform pairing in a secure environment
- Keep PIN codes private and do not store the PIN codes in the device
- · Implement application-level security.

Bluetooth Profiles

The device supports the following Bluetooth services:

- Service Discovery Protocol (SDP) Handles the search for known and specific services as well as general services.
- Serial Port Profile (SPP) Allows use of RFCOMM protocol to emulate serial cable connection between two Bluetooth peer devices. For example, connecting the device to a printer.
- Object Push Profile (OPP) Allows the device to push and pull objects to and from a push server.
- Advanced Audio Distribution Profile (A2DP) Allows the device to stream stereo-quality audio to a wireless headset or wireless stereo speakers.
- Audio/Video Remote Control Profile (AVRCP) Allows the device to control A/V equipment to which a user has access. It may be used in concert with A2DP.
- Personal Area Network (PAN) Allows the use of Bluetooth Network Encapsulation Protocol to provide L3
 networking capabilities over a Bluetooth link. Only PANU role is supported.
- Human Interface Device Profile (HID) Allows Bluetooth keyboards, pointing devices, gaming devices and remote monitoring devices to connect to the device.
- Headset Profile (HSP) Allows a hands-free device, such as a Bluetooth headset, to place and receive calls on the device.
- Hands-Free Profile (HFP) Allows car hands-free kits to communicate with the device in the car.
- Out of Band (OOB) Allows exchange of information used in the pairing process. Pairing is completed using the Bluetooth radio, but requires information from the OOB mechanism. Using OOB with NFC enables pairing when devices simply get close, rather than requiring a lengthy discovery process.
- Phone Book Access Profile (PBAP) Allows exchange of Phone Book Objects between a car kit and a
 mobile device to allow the car kit to display the name of the incoming caller; allow the car kit to download the
 phone book so the user can initiate a call from the car display.
- Object Push Profile (OPP) Allows the TC70x/TC75x to push and pull objects to and from a push server.
- Symbol Serial Interface Profile (SSI) Allows for communication with RS507 Bluetooth Imager.

Bluetooth Power States

The Bluetooth radio is off by default.

- Suspend When the TC70x/TC75x goes into suspend mode, the Bluetooth radio stays on.
- Airplane Mode When the TC70x/TC75x is placed in Airplane Mode, the Bluetooth radio turns off. When
 Airplane mode is disabled, the Bluetooth radio returns to the prior state. When in Airplane Mode, the
 Bluetooth radio can be turned back on if desired.

Bluetooth Radio Power

Turn off the Bluetooth radio to save power or if entering an area with radio restrictions (e.g., an airplane). When the radio is off, other Bluetooth devices cannot see or connect to the device. Turn on the Bluetooth radio to exchange information with other Bluetooth devices (within range). Communicate only with Bluetooth radios in close proximity.



NOTE To achieve the best battery life turn off radios when not in use.

Enabling Bluetooth

- Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel.
- Touch x to turn Bluetooth on.
- 3. Touch O.

Disabling Bluetooth

- 1. Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel.
- Touch * to turn Bluetooth off.
- 3. Touch O.

Discovering Bluetooth Device(s)

The TC70x/TC75x can receive information from discovered devices without pairing. However, once paired, the TC70x/TC75x and a paired device exchange information automatically when the Bluetooth radio is on. To find Bluetooth devices in the area:

- 1. Ensure that Bluetooth is enabled on both devices.
- 2. Ensure that the Bluetooth device to discover is in discoverable mode.
- 3. Ensure that the two devices are within 10 meters (32.8 feet) of one another.
- Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel.
- 5. Touch Bluetooth.
- Touch More Settings. The Bluetooth screen appears.
- 7. The TC70x/TC75x begins searching for discoverable Bluetooth devices in the area and displays them under Available devices.
- 8. Scroll through the list and select a device. The **Bluetooth pairing request** dialog box appears.
- 9. Enter a PIN in the text box and touch **OK**. Enter the same PIN on the other device.
- 10. For Simple Pairing, touch Pair on both devices.
- 11. The Bluetooth device is added to the **Bluetooth devices** list and a trusted ("paired") connection is established.

Changing the Bluetooth Name

By default, the TC70x/TC75x has a generic Bluetooth name that is visible to other devices when connected.

1. Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel and then touch ...



2. Touch * Bluetooth.

- 3. If Bluetooth is not on, touch the switch to turn Bluetooth on.
- 4. Touch .
- 5. Touch Rename device.
- 6. Enter a name and touch Rename.
- 7. Touch O.

Connecting to a Bluetooth Device

Once paired, connect to a Bluetooth device.

- 1. Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel and then touch ...
- 2. Touch Bluetooth.
- 3. In the list, touch the unconnected Bluetooth device.
- **4.** When connected, Connected appears below the device name.

Selecting Profiles on the Bluetooth Device

Some Bluetooth devices have multiple profiles. To select a profile:

- Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel and then touch ...
- Touch **Bluetooth**.
- 3. In the **PAIRED DEVICES** list, touch a next to the device name.
- 4. Under PROFILES, check or uncheck a profile to allow the device to use that profile.
- 5. Touch O.

Unpairing a Bluetooth Device

To unpair a Bluetooth device and erase all pairing information:

1. Swipe down with two fingers from the status bar to open the quick access panel and then touch ...



- Touch **Bluetooth**.
- 3. In the **PAIRED DEVICES** list, touch **p** next to the device name.
- 4. Touch FORGET.
- 5. Touch O.

Near Field Communications

NFC/HF RFID is a short-range wireless connectivity technology standard that enables secure transaction between a reader and a contactless smartcard. The technology is based on ISO/IEC 14443,ISO 18092, Type-A, Type-B, Type-F, and ISO/IEC 15693 (vicinity) standards, using the HF 13.56 MHz unlicensed band. The TC70x/TC75x support 3 operating modes:

- · Reader mode
- Peer-to-Peer communication
- · Card Emulation mode.

Using NFC, the TC70x/TC75x can:

- · Read contactless cards such as contactless tickets, ID cards and ePassport.
- Read and write information to contactless cards such as SmartPosters and tickets, as well as devices with NFC interface such as vending machines.
- Read information from supported medical sensors.
- Pair with supported Bluetooth devices such as printers and headsets.
- Exchange data with another NFC device.
- Emulate contactless card such as payment, ticket or SmartPoster.

The TC70x/TC75x NFC antenna is uniquely positioned to read NFC cards from the top of the device while being held in the user's hand.

Reading NFC Cards

- 1. Launch an NFC enabled application.
- 2. Hold device as shown.




Figure 6-7 Reading Cards

3. Move TC70x/TC75x close to the NFC card until the TC70x/TC75x detects the card.

4. Hold the card steadily until the transaction is complete (usually indicated by the application).

Sharing Information Using NFC

You can beam content like a web page, contact cards, pictures, YouTube links or location information from your screen to another device by bringing the devices together back to back.

Make sure both devices are unlocked, support NFC, and have both NFC and Android Beam turned on.

- 1. Open a screen that contains a web page, video, photo or contact.
- 2. Move the top of the TC70x/TC75x toward the top of the other device.




Figure 6-8 Sharing Data Using NFC

When the devices connect, you hear a sound, the image on the screen reduces in size, the message **Touch to beam** appears.

3. Touch anywhere on the screen.

The transfer begins.




Figure 7-1 2—Slot Charge Only Cradle




Figure 7-2 Battery Charging




Figure 7-3 Spare Battery Charging




Figure 7-4 2-Slot USB/Ethernet Cradle




Figure 7-5 Battery Charging




Figure 7-6 Spare Battery Charging




Figure 7-8 LED Indicators




Figure 7-9 5-Slot Charge Only Cradle




Figure 7-10 Battery Charging




Figure 7-11 4-Slot Charge Only Cradle with Battery Charger




Figure 7-12 Battery Charging




Figure 7-13 5-Slot Ethernet Cradle




Figure 7-14 Battery Charging




Figure 7-15 5-Slot Ethernet Cradle with 4-Slot Battery Charger




Figure 7-16 4-Slot Battery Charger




Figure 7-18 Connect Adapter Cable to Audio Adapter




Figure 7-19 Audio Adapter Installation




Figure 7-20 Device with 3.5 mm Audio Adapter in Holster




Figure 7-21 Remove Audio Adapter from Device




Figure 7-22 Cable Installation




Figure 7-23 Cable Attached to TC75




Figure 7-24 Cable Removed from Device




Figure 7-25 Power Setup




Figure 7-26 Press Down on Cable




Figure 7-27 Remove Cable from Device




Figure 7-28 Charging




Figure 7-29 Lock Cable Cup




Figure 7-30 Connect Cable to Power Supply




Figure 7-31 Cable Installation




Figure 7-32 Cable Attached to Device




Figure 7-33 DEX Cable Connection

1. Press down on the cable.




Figure 7-34 Press Down on Cable

2. Rotate away from the TC70x/TC75x. The magnetics release the cable from the TC70x/TC75x.




Figure 7-35 Remove Cable from Device

Trigger Handle

The Trigger Handle adds a gun-style handle with a scanning trigger to the device. It increases comfort when using the device in scan-intensive applications for extended periods of time.




Figure 7-36 Trigger Handle

Installing the Attachment Plate to Trigger Handle

To install the attachment plate to the Trigger Handle:

- 1. Insert the loop end of the tether into the slot on the bottom of the handle.
- 2. Feed the attachment plate through the loop.




Figure 7-37 Install Attachment Plate to Handle

3. Pull the attachment plate until the loop tightens on the tether.

Installing the Trigger Handle Plate

1. Press and hold the **Power** button until the menu appears.

- 2. Touch Power off.
- 3. Touch OK.
- 4. Press in the two battery latches.
- 5. Lift the battery from the device.
- **6.** Remove the hand strap filler plate from the hand strap slot. Store the hand strap filler plate in a safe place for future replacement.




Figure 7-38 Remove Hand Strap Plate

7. Insert the attachment plate into the hand strap slot.




Figure 7-39 Insert Trigger Handle Plate

- 8. Insert the battery, bottom first, into the battery compartment in the back of the device.




Figure 7-40 Connect Device to Trigger Handle




Figure 7-42 Press Release Latches




Figure 7-44 Vehicle Charging Cable Cup

1. Insert the TC70x/TC75x into the cup of the Vehicle Charging Cable.




Figure 7-45 Charging

- 3. Slide the two yellow locking tabs up to lock the cable to the TC70x/TC75x.




Figure 7-46 Lock Cable Cup

4. Insert the Cigarette Lighter plug into the vehicle cigarette lighter socket.




Figure 7-47 Connect Cable to Vehicle Power Source

Battery Charging

Main Battery Charging

The device's Charging/Notification LED indicates the status of the battery charging in the device.

The 4,620 mAh battery fully charges in less than five hours at room temperature.

Charging Temperature

Charge batteries in temperatures from 0°C to 40°C (32°F to 104°F). The device always performs battery charging in a safe and intelligent manner. At higher temperatures (e.g. approximately +37°C (+98°F)) the device may for small periods of time alternately enable and disable battery charging to keep the battery at acceptable temperatures. The device indicates when charging is disabled due to abnormal temperatures via its LED.

Vehicle Cradle

Refer to the TC70x/TC75x Integrator Guide for Android Version 6.0.1 for information on installing the Vehicle Cradle.

The cradle:

- holds the TC70x/TC75x securely in place
- provides power for operating the TC70x/TC75x
- re-charges the battery in the TC70x/TC75x.

The cradle is powered by the vehicle's 12V or 24V electrical system. The operating voltage range is 9V to 32V and supplies a maximum current of 3A.




Figure 7-48 Vehicle Cradle

Device Insertion and Removal




Figure 7-49 Install Device into Vehicle Cradle




Figure 7-50 Remove Device from Vehicle Cradle

Battery Charging

Ensure the cradle is connected to a power source.

Insert the TC70x/TC75x into the cradle. The TC70x/TC75x starts to charge through the cradle as soon as it is inserted. This does not deplete the vehicle battery significantly. The battery charges in approximately four hours. See *Table 1-3 on page 1-10* for charging indications.



NOTE The Vehicle Cradle operating temperature is -40°C to +85°C. When in the cradle, the TC70x/TC75x will only charge when its temperature is between 0°C to +40°C.

TC7X Vehicle Communication Charging Cradle

The Vehicle Communication Charging Cradle:

- holds the TC70x/TC75x securely in place
- provides power for operating the TC70x/TC75x
- re-charges the battery in the TC70x/TC75x.

The cradle is powered by the USB I/O Hub.




Figure 7-51 TC7X Vehicle Communication Charging Cradle

Device Insertion and Removal




Figure 7-52 Insert and Remove Device into Cradle

To ensure the TC70x/TC75x was inserted correctly, listen for the audible click that signifies that the TC70x/TC75x locking mechanism was enabled and the TC70x/TC75x was locked into place.

Device Battery Charging

Insert the TC70x/TC75x into the cradle. The TC70x/TC75x starts to charge through the cradle as soon as it is inserted. This does not deplete the vehicle battery significantly. The battery charges in approximately four hours. See *Table 1-3 on page 1-10* for all charging indications.

Charging Note

The Vehicle Cradle operating temperature is -40°C to +85°C. When in the cradle, the TC70x/TC75x will only charge when its temperature is between 0°C to +40°C.

USB I/O Hub

The USB I/O Hub:

- · provides power to a vehicle cradle
- provides USB hub for three USB devices (such as printers)
- provides a powered USB port for charging another device.

The cradle is powered by the vehicle's 12V or 24V electrical system. The operating voltage range is 9V to 32V and supplies a maximum current of 3Ato the vehicle cradle and 1.5 A to the four USB ports simultaneously.

Connect USB Cables

The USB I/O Hub provides three USB ports for connecting devices such as printers to a device in the vehicle cradle. To connect USB cables:

1. Slide the cable cover down and remove.

- 3. Place each cable into the cable holder.




Figure 7-55 Connect USB Cable

External USB Cable

The USB I/O Hub provides a USB port for charging external devices such as cell phones. This port is for charging only.

1. Open the USB Access Cover.

2. Insert the USB cable connector into the USB port.




Figure 7-57 Insert External USB Cable

Power to Vehicle Cradle

The USB I/O Hub can provide power to a Vehicle Cradle.

- 1. Connect the Power Output Cable connector to the Power Input Cable connector of the Vehicle Cradle.
- 2. Tighten thumbscrews by hand until tight.





Figure 7-58 Connect Power to Vehicle Cradle

CHAPTER 8 MAINTENANCE AND TROUBLESHOOTING

This chapter includes instructions on cleaning and storing the device, and provides troubleshooting solutions for potential problems during operation.

Maintaining the Device

For trouble-free service, observe the following tips when using the TC70x/TC75x:

- Do not scratch the screen of the TC70x/TC75x. When working with the TC70x/TC75x use the supplied stylus or plastic-tipped pens intended for use device a touch-sensitive screen. Never use an actual pen or pencil or other sharp object on the surface of the TC75x screen.
- The touch-sensitive screen of the TC70x/TC75x is glass. Do not to drop the TC70x/TC75x or subject it to strong impact.
- Protect the TC70x/TC75x from temperature extremes. Do not leave it on the dashboard of a car on a hot day, and keep it away from heat sources.
- Do not store or use the TC70x/TC75x in any location that is dusty, damp, or wet.
- Use a soft lens cloth to clean the TC70x/TC75x. If the surface of the TC70x/TC75x screen becomes soiled, clean it with a soft cloth moistened with a diluted window-cleaning solution.
- Periodically replace the rechargeable battery to ensure maximum battery life and product performance. Battery life depends on individual usage patterns.

Battery Safety Guidelines

- The area in which the units are charged should be clear of debris and combustible materials or chemicals. Particular care should be taken where the device is charged in a non commercial environment.
- Follow battery usage, storage, and charging guidelines found in this guide.
- Improper battery use may result in a fire, explosion, or other hazard.
- To charge the mobile device battery, the battery and charger temperatures must be between +32°F and +104°F (0°C and +40°C)
- Do not use incompatible batteries and chargers. Use of an incompatible battery or charger may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage, or other hazard. If you have any questions about the compatibility of a battery or a charger, contact the Global Customer Support Center.

- For devices that utilize a USB port as a charging source, the device shall only be connected to products that bear the USB-IF logo or have completed the USB-IF compliance program.
- To enable authentication of an approved battery, as required by IEEE1725 clause 10.2.1, all batteries will
 carry a hologram. Do not fit any battery without checking it has the authentication hologram.
- Do not disassemble or open, crush, bend or deform, puncture, or shred.
- Severe impact from dropping any battery-operated device on a hard surface could cause the battery to overheat.
- Do not short circuit a battery or allow metallic or conductive objects to contact the battery terminals.
- Do not modify or remanufacture, attempt to insert foreign objects into the battery, immerse or expose to water or other liquids, or expose to fire, explosion, or other hazard.
- Do not leave or store the equipment in or near areas that might get very hot, such as in a parked vehicle or near a radiator or other heat source. Do not place battery into a microwave oven or dryer.
- · Battery usage by children should be supervised.
- Please follow local regulations to properly dispose of used re-chargeable batteries.
- · Do not dispose of batteries in fire.
- In the event of a battery leak, do not allow the liquid to come in contact with the skin or eyes. If contact has been made, wash the affected area with large amounts of water and seek medical advice.
- If you suspect damage to your equipment or battery, contact the Customer Support to arrange for inspection.

Approved Cleanser Active Ingredients

100% of the active ingredients in any cleaner must consist of one or some combination of the following: isopropyl alcohol, bleach/sodium hypochlorite, hydrogen peroxide or mild dish soap.

Harmful Ingredients

The following chemicals are known to damage the plastics on the device and should not come in contact with the device: ammonia solutions, compounds of amines or ammonia; acetone; ketones; ethers; aromatic and chlorinated hydrocarbons; acqueous or alcoholic alkaline solutions; ethanolamine; toluene; trichloroethylene; benzene; carbolic acid and TB-lysoform.

Cleaning Instructions

Do not apply liquid directly to the device. Dampen a soft cloth or use pre-moistened wipes. Do not wrap the device in the cloth or wipe, but gently wipe the unit. Be careful not to let liquid pool around the display window or other places. Allow the unit to air dry before use.

Special Cleaning Notes

Many vinyl gloves contain phthalate additives, which are often not recommended for medical use and are known to be harmful to the housing of the device. The device should not be handled while wearing vinyl gloves containing phthalates, or before hands are washed to remove contaminant residue after gloves are removed. If products containing any of the harmful ingredients listed above are used prior to handling the device, such as hand sanitizer that contain ethanolamine, hands must be completely dry before handling the device to prevent damage to the plastics.

Cleaning Materials Required

- Alcohol wipes
- Lens tissue
- Cotton-tipped applicators
- Isopropyl alcohol
- · Can of compressed air with a tube.

Cleaning Frequency

The cleaning frequency is up to the customer's discretion due to the varied environments in which the mobile devices are used. They may be cleaned as frequently as required, but it is advisable to clean the camera window periodically when used in dirty environments to ensure optimum performance.

Cleaning the TC70x/TC75x

Housing

Using the alcohol wipes, wipe the housing including buttons.

Display

The display can be wiped down with the alcohol wipes, but care should be taken not to allow any pooling of liquid around the edges of the display. Immediately dry the display with a soft, non-abrasive cloth to prevent streaking.

Camera and Exit Window

Wipe the camera and exit window periodically with a lens tissue or other material suitable for cleaning optical material such as eyeglasses.

Connector Cleaning

To clean the connectors:

- 1. Remove the main battery from mobile computer.
- 2. Dip the cotton portion of the cotton-tipped applicator in isopropyl alcohol.
- 3. Rub the cotton portion of the cotton-tipped applicator back-and-forth across the connector. Do not leave any cotton residue on the connector.
- 4. Repeat at least three times.
- 5. Use the cotton-tipped applicator dipped in alcohol to remove any grease and dirt near the connector area.
- 6. Use a dry cotton-tipped applicator and repeat steps 4 through 6.



CAUTION Do not point nozzle at yourself and others, ensure the nozzle or tube is away from your face.

- 7. Spray compressed air on the connector area by pointing the tube/nozzle about ½ inch away from the surface.
- 8. Inspect the area for any grease or dirt, repeat if required.

Cleaning Cradle Connectors

To clean the connectors on a cradle:

- 1. Remove the DC power cable from the cradle.
- 2. Dip the cotton portion of the cotton-tipped applicator in isopropyl alcohol.
- 3. Rub the cotton portion of the cotton-tipped applicator along the pins of the connector. Slowly move the applicator back-and-forth from one side of the connector to the other. Do not leave any cotton residue on the connector.
- All sides of the connector should also be rubbed with the cotton-tipped applicator.



CAUTION Do not point nozzle at yourself and others, ensure the nozzle or tube is pointed away from your face.

- 5. Spray compressed air in the connector area by pointing the tube/nozzle about ½ inch away from the surface.
- **6.** Remove any lint left by the cotton-tipped applicator.
- 7. If grease and other dirt can be found on other areas of the cradle, use a lint-free cloth and alcohol to remove.
- 8. Allow at least 10 to 30 minutes (depending on ambient temperature and humidity) for the alcohol to air dry before applying power to cradle.
 - If the temperature is low and humidity is high, longer drying time is required. Warm temperature and dry humidity requires less drying time.

Troubleshooting

The following tables provides typical problems that might arise and the solution for correcting the problem.
